

Doug McGregor, Frank Meadows and Catherine Moore after four Sunday School students have unwrapped the new doors.





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


The *Tidings* staff suggested I provide this column as a perspective from 2 years as Chair of Council and I am pleased to do so. Have you ever gone "AARGH!!!, Too many changes! Stop!!" I've sometimes said "This stupid church! Why so many changes? Why not just enjoy Sunday services for a while??!!" I found one answer. About 4 years ago some people dreamed of a better way of governing our church and of improving access for all and these changes have been wonderful.

We've been using the Council model for 1 year in transition and 1 year officially. It works so well and feels so right that I have to consciously remember what it was like "before". Though the access addition has only been used since Christmas Eve, it feels natural already. These changes seem so simple and common sense, so inevitable now that they are done. I've started to forget how insecure I felt at first; how difficult the decisions were; how hard it was to have faith that things could work out.

After all the struggle and work and disruption, we've achieved our goals. Now I can't even imagine going back to the "old way". So the next time someone comes up with a bright new idea, I'll probably say "This stupid church...". But I'll listen.

LAURENA WOODS REMEMBERS

Can you imagine knowing someone who had seen seventeen Prime Ministers come and go and hopes to see one or two more? Someone who was immersed in the throes of church union? Come to the 11:00 am service any Sunday and meet Mrs. Laurena Woods at coffee and conversation.

Born on Aug. 30, 1901 in Weston, Ontario, she later grew up in Toronto, living above the general store operated by her father on Queen Street, a colourful area then as well as now. The older of two sisters, she insists that she was "the rebel" in the family. Her job as secretary to Principal Gandier of Knox College gave her an inside view of the not-always-Christian struggle for power and property at the time of church union (1925). She reports that Knox College was given to the Presbyterians who did not join the union. Victoria, the Methodist College, gave over the top floors for the new United Church theological training, until Emmanuel College was constructed. With a rebellious glint in her eye she tells of the ingenious prank of the U.C. theologs who purloined the front door key of Knox College and had it cemented in the historic cornerstone of the new college.

While working at the college she met her future mate, a theolog by the name of John Norval Woods, whose namesake was John Norval Proudfoot, the missionary founder of our congregation. Laurena and Norval were married and began their ministry in 1931, serving exclusively in London Conference. A long, sometimes stimulating, sometimes dreary series of rural three point charges took them first to Dawn Mills, a tiny village near Dresden - also serving Wabash and Lindsay Rd. Further moves followed, to Louisville, Providence, Sparta, Exeter, Thedford and finally Sarnia where Norval retired. There were times when she spiritedly refused to be the submissive pastor's wife and would not agree to a request from the Church women to "cook two chickens, bake two cakes and bring two jars of pickles." I first met Laurena and Norval at the village of Louisville in the 1930's. "The worst manse we ever had. The previous minister kept chickens in the pantry and you can imagine what we had to clean up." Those days at Louisville United Church offer precious memories for me in many ways. One of the loveliest is that Mrs. Woods is about the only living person who remembers me as a little boy. She even recalls how we used to pump up the gasoline lamps, light them and hang them from the church ceilings for the evening service.

Laurena Woods is very proud of her three children who have all had interesting and contributory careers of their own. Her two daughters once came to her to report a firm decision they had made. Both Louise and Marian said "When we are old enough

to be married we are not going to marry ministers". "What's wrong with your dad?" countered Laurena. "He's never home and always on call" was their reply.

Naturally as one might guess, they both married ministers. Louise met Peter Rolston, a fellow student at U.B.C. who worked part-time on our U.C. mission boat Thomas Crosby. Marian met Jim Kirkwood at U of T. Their work and mission drew them to extended service in Africa and later Jim served in the office of World Outreach at United Church head office in Toronto.

Ken became a teacher but did not forego the call for service to missions. He was a Crossroads volunteer under the charismatic leadership of Bishop Robinson, the black pastor with the vision

to start Crossroads. Jim worked along with other North American and African volunteers building an amphitheatre in Kitui, Kenya. His unselfish service brought an unexpected reward when he met, fell in love and married another Crossroader, Jan Panebaker. Ken is retired, living in Midland and very involved in working for "Atlantic Challenge", a movement sponsoring international aquatic competitions for young people.

When the Woods made their last change of residence they chose to move to London where Norval began treatment for cancer of the lung. Laurena became very committed to the care of cancer patients so that after Norval died she continued to work as a volunteer in Dr. Ivan Smith's clinic. After many years as a volunteer she received a small salary as coordinator of drivers; her first paid job since leaving Emmanuel College in 1931.

The first years in London might have broken a less stubborn, (read rebellious), determined woman. She had the care of her very ill husband, Louise a teacher at South Secondary School, Ken at Teacher's College, her own aged and cantankerous mother, all in one small cottage. When she was finally living on her own she had to choose a church home. From 728 Chester St. where she still lives, she had to take a bus downtown and another back south to get to Calvary, the closest United Church. A downtown church would require only one bus ride. She attended church every Sunday at one of Calvary, Metropolitan or First-St. Andrew's. One day she ran into Rev. Alex Farquhar at the hospital. He greeted her warmly and said "It's nice to see you attending church once in a while". He arranged to have her membership transferred. Two weeks later she was confronted by Rev. George Goth who insisted she should have joined Metropolitan. Laurena giggled and simply and firmly replied "No, because I decided to join First-St. Andrew's." This is the kind of rebel you like to have on our side.

At First-St. Andrew's, Laurena became a loyal supporter and

worker with the Thursday night U.C.W. Sundays, she enjoyed the music and usually the sermons.

Asked if she would choose the life of a minister's wife if she could start over, she agreed it had been a rewarding and interesting career. Her only regret was that they had been stuck in London Conference and never experienced life in a pioneer ministry out west.

"Would you like to make it to your 100th birthday?"

"Heavens no."

But she will if she wants to.

Grow in them the fruit of gentleness that they might understand our frailty.

Grow in them the fruit of peace that they might be free of manipulation.

Grow in them the fruit of love that they might always serve out of a divine well spring.

I plead, gracious Father, for our spiritual leaders.

Protect them from the attacks of the evil One.

Protect them from the distractions that render their work ineffective.

Protect them from the criticism of well-meaning people.

All these things I ask in the name of Jesus Christ

Amen.



Recently returned from Brazil where they served with our partner Methodist Church for seven years, the Fetters touched many bases with our congregation. At the 9:15 am service in the Chapel, they did a dialogue sermon. At the 11:00 am service, Judy told the children's story, and then went into the Sunday School to talk further with the children there, while Lawrie spoke to the congregation about the religious, social and political life in Brazil.


For the Fetters, it was a double-duty weekend. On Saturday they had been leaders of a Presbytery Mission Festival held at Siloam United Church.

On returning to their home in Victoria they will be doing Mission Deputation work in British Columbia until Lawrie's official retirement in March of this year. But we can be very certain that for this enthusiastic and dedicated couple, retirement will simply mean a new opportunity to continue the ministry which they have so capably exercised in Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia and Brazil.

The words of the hymn written by Judy Fetter, which we sang as part of our Mission Education Sunday service, very clearly express the optimism and the faith which we must feel at First-St. Andrew's following the Fetters' visit:

Mrs. Ardath Fimbrogason-Hill, a nurse-educator with considerable experience in personal counselling, and Dr. Jo Ann Silcox, a psychologist, work as a team to provide initial assessment and follow-through counselling for individuals, couples, families or groups facing personal transitional crises.




