

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

As Co-Chairs of the Stewardship Campaign 2000 we set out to do 4 things

- increase the annual offerings by at least \$40,000 from our 1) FSA congregation through pledges and envelope givings
 - ensure a contact was made with each FSA family 2)
- 3) increase total participation in the life and work of our church through the volunteer program
 - inform our congregation about all aspects of FSA. 4)

Through the generosity of Gerry Coffin for the use of the Ontario Commercial Collection Call Centre and over 20 hard working FSA volunteer callers and visitors, we contacted and visited with over 452 FSA households and left messages with 30 others with whom we were unable to make connections. We have in excess of 291 pledge sheets returned resulting in an excellent \$41,927.64 increase in pledged offerings. The church office has received over 200 volunteer sheets with up to date information from people ready to share in the work of our church. During morning services, five members of our congregation delivered a minute for mission on Friendship, Learning, Worship, Action and Finances. Once again the popular FSA on Display gave all that attended a first hand look at the life and workings of our church.

We'd really like to thank the many volunteers that helped us make this campaign a success.

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

GOD'S STEWARDS: ANNA HOLMAN

Anna Holman is someone who likes to be active and involved. Retirement from her position as librarian at Althouse College thirteen years ago meant only a shift in focus, not a slowing down. She immediately joined a gymnasium and learned from the instructor that there was a great need for people to teach seniors'

exercise classes.

After earning her Fitness Instructor certificates, she taught classes for the YM/YWCA and at seniors' centres as a volunteer before being hired to teach fitness at the Canadian Centre for Activity and Ageing. Participants, whose average age is 82, are referred to the centre by their doctors after being diagnosed with osteoporosis.

Anna also teaches the same exercises at the Boys' and Girls' Club of London three times per week. For three years she demonstrated exercises for seniors on cable TV. On the days when she is not teaching she walks 3-8 miles, weather permitting. Not surprisingly, she is in great shape and has no aches or pains in her joints.

Anna recently moved from the Grosvenor Apartments, but while there she started an exercise program that she ran for two years. She says that her new apartment has seniors' activities, but no exercise program. Can one be far behind?

With her knowledge of school libraries both here and in Ottawa, she offered to help look after the FSA library when she joined the church five years ago. The cataloguing, filing and processing of materials take about ten hours a week. On Sundays she can be found at the 9:15 service greeting worshippers and collecting the offering.

In the community Anna serves the seniors' population by sitting



on the Board of Directors for the Council of Seniors. One of her tasks with this advocacy organization is to explain to various seniors' groups the Care Wish or Living Will. Another project, requested by the London Police, was to write and present three skits illustrating common scams and frauds perpetrated against seniors.

These skits have been presented on Cable TV and to several groups in the area.

A strong proponent of the importance of physical activity for seniors, Anna was once invited to give a talk to medical students on this subject. Seated at the front of the room dressed in a hospital gown, and looking somewhat frail, she greeted the arriving students. Then suddenly to the strains of "The Old Gray Mare She Ain't What She Used To Be" Anna popped out of the chair, flung off the hospital gown, and in her leotards and body suit led the amazed students in a round of vigorous exercise. She is a living illustration of the value of exercise. She is also a model for the rest of us.

"BABY - LOOK AT YOU NOW!"

The FSA nursery is well on its way to becoming a topnotch facility for the care and supervision of young children on Sunday mornings. Last year the various units of UCW compiled a list of possibilities for their trust money. The "suggestions" list was then prioritized, helping to give FSA, in conjunction with the Property Committee, new chairs, a renovated kitchen, and now a fresh new

nursery. The UCW and Property collaborated on what changes and additions needed to be made for the new nursery. The UCW alone set aside \$10,000 for the job, with monetary assistance from property, memorial donations, and the memorial fund of \$4,000.

The nursery needed a tremendous amount of work, and a vision for the finished product was created by visiting other London churches to see what their nurseries offered. The room was practically gutted; the old and broken from days long past were pitched, and the room was ready for a new look.

The room now boasts a new carpet, shelving unit, light system, telephone, playpen and toys, and a counter unit with locking cupboards and drawers and a much needed washing facility. The room still has a long way to come, and many possibilities for decorbut now, the fundamental needs have been met.

The new nursery offers a safe, sanitary environment for families looking for a place to leave their little ones during the service. So far, the nursery has been met with great enthusiasm and will undoubtedly succeed in raising an awareness here of exceptional facilities. A standard of nursery care has certainly been met with a "security system" consisting of beepers for parents to take into the service, and a nurse on duty each week. Drop by, because the new nursery is definitely worth a peek-a-boo!

A LETTER FROM OUR GARDENER, ED ELLIS: HOW'S IT GROWING!

It's still winter, but not too early to start thinking about gardening. And what a garden we've got: All the lawns, trees and gardens around the church. And it all has to be looked after, groomed and cleaned. It costs, of course, but there's a way of cutting those costs.

The success of last fall's cleanup at First-St. Andrew's has inspired another clean-up day this spring.. It will take place April 21st.

For several years now, the maintenance of our grounds was headed by Ed Ellis, with pruning done by Elmer Butt.

Now, Ed wants to retire his shovel and rake and has sent a letter to the Property Committee in an effort to find a replacement.

Ed points out that the grounds surrounding FSA "provide a comforting and warm welcome to all who visit our beautiful church. They create a positive first impression which tells others that here is a place of beauty, tranquility and spiritual comfort.

Ed's Letter is titled: "A thing of beauty is a joy forever" amd goes on to talk about the thousands of visitors and hundreds of wedding guests that take time to pass by or visit out church.

But he notes that, "like everything else of beauty and value, it doesn't just happen or take care of itself." And there are ways to get the job done:: "Do it yourself, or hire it done." A third option, he suggests, is "to form a team and share the workload".

Ed says FSA "needs a team of committed members to form a 'Garden Club'. What better way to serve the Lord, the rest of the congregation and have a positive outreach in the city!"

FSA has twelve flowerbeds/shrub areas that require love and care. Ed says that willing volunteer Gardeners would work in pairs...taking on greater or lesser responsibilities depending on their time and physical limitations.

As an example, Ed cites the wrought iron Flower Urns at the front steps to the sanctuary.

The major problem is they require frequent watering during the summer. "In the Fall, they could take on a 'harvest theme' and later a Christmas theme. Two small stone planters at the east entry require similar tending. there are a dozen areas that show off our "curb appeal"

Ed concludes that "now is the time for action and leadership... a Gardeners' Club coordinator-administrator type" And best of all, he says, "He/She could be of

any age or ability... and never even touch a trowel, spade or plant.

An option, Ed writes, is to "simply pay for these services by hiring a landscaping firm!"

That's the challenge from our gardener Ed Ellis.
