

Church considers the Council system of government for 1993

Existing Structure

Since 1925 First-St.
Andrew's United Church has functioned under the "Official Board" system: an Official Board is recognized as the court of the pastoral charge. Its duties and accountability to the congregation are those established in the United Church Manual.

Visioning Process

During 1990-1991, the congregation evaluated our spiritual and temporal objectives. The Visioning Committee made these positive recommendations: a) a new mission and strategy; b) the congregation have ultimate authority over all committees; c) an improved process of choosing leaders; d) more efficient and effective reporting and communication.

At our 1991 annual general meeting, the congregation passed a motion calling for review of our structure.

The Recommendation

To implement this motion for structural review, a Restructuring Committee composed of members of the Official Board Executive and members at large spent the last year studying our present committee system and alternatives. We now recommend that First-St. Andrew's adopt a Church Council style of self-government.

This recommendation and principle will be subject to an evaluation process culminating at the annual meeting in January, 1993. During this year of education, the Official Board Executive should ensure: participation and review by the entire congregation and each of its committees, and that an implementation and transition strategy be developed. cont'd page 5)

Pastoral Role

Many of us know Joan Bancroft, who will serve as our Minister of Pastoral Care until June 30 this year. Born and raised in Winnipeg, Joan and her husband Michael have two children, David, 21, and Catherine, 19. Mrs. Bancroft has been a member at First-St. Andrew's since 1971, when she and her family returned to Canada from a few years' stay in Cambridge, England. As so many others, Joan was drawn to FSA by its excellent music, and stayed.

As Minister of Pastoral Care, Joan is the primary leader and advisor of all our visitors of the ill and housebound. Her responsibility includes work with the membership committee and new members, and the organization of baptisms. She does much visitation herself, a role in which she is experienced and comfortable. "God speaks with us most profoundly through other



people. Not a day goes by in pastoral ministry when, even in casual contacts, the uniqueness, courage and sensitivity in others does not touch me," she said.

In 1986 Mrs. Bancroft was searching for a change. She began studies with the Canadian Association for Pastoral Education (CAPE), taking 400 hours of clinical and group counselling courses, an opportunity normally reserved for clergy.

With her BA and her teaching certificate, Joan was accepted into part-time study in the Master of Divinity program. In 1987, Dundas Centre United contracted her to serve in its pastoral ministry. In the years since, Joan has also been the United Church Hospital Visitor at St. Joseph's and University Hospitals.

Joan works Monday, Tuesday and Thursday each week. If you or a member you know need a visit, call Joan at the church (679-8182) or at home (472-4661).

The short drama served to stir the elders' subsequent small group discussions on how they feel about women's roles in the church and society.

Did You Know?

Several years ago, I found myself in search of a new church. The little country church I had attended since childhood no longer proved practical. I was drawn to our "grand lady," her beauty and by the warmth and friendship inside. Seven years have passed and I am constantly amazed by the stories and changes connected with First-St. Andrew's. I would like to share with you a condensed version of some of my discoveries.

Did you know....

- the first cornerstone was laid by the Rev. John Scott, May 25, 1868
- this same cornerstone contains a "time capsule" -- a tinencased bottle filled with coins, newspaper clippings and a history of the church.
- the actual cost of the church was \$25,000.00
- the Sunday School Building was erected in 1905
- the Rev. Willam Proudfoot was the first official minister, preaching his first sermon November 11, 1832.
- Proudfoot rests in Oakland cemetery on Oxford Street West.
- 1938 heralded the joining of St. Andrew's and First United churches.

My curiosity grew as a I questioned the history of FSA. Here are some of the cosmetic changes she has undergone:

- the original chancel consisted of rough-hewn boards, no windows, and organ pipes arranged in an arch
- the choir covered the entire chancel area from the left door to the right door.
- to the left of the chancel (where the stairs now exist) stood a small vestry (office), its purpose unknown, and another larger vestry to the right.
- the gallery was strictly used for seating however the balcony stretched in a horseshoe formation to the front of the sanctuary. It seated approximately 900 people.
- renovation took place when the two congregations amalgamated in 1938.
- the horseshoe balcony was renovated, reducing the church's seating capacity to an estimated 1100 (presently 600-700).
- the gallery contained pews stretching from the back wall in a tiered assemblage; these original pews still remain.
- the organ and choir remained in the chancel but the pipes were hidden behind curtains where the artificial windows exist.

- our present organ was built in 1969 by Casavant Frères of Quebec.
- the gallery had to be reinforced to hold the twenty-one ton organ.
- in 1938, the beautiful stained glass window in the chancel was donated by Edward Reid, a former president of London Life, and his brother Thomas in memory of their parents.
- 1955 A.C. Silverwood, donated several of the other windows which grace our sanctuary.
- the late seventies brought the realization a new ceiling was desperately needed after a large chunk of plaster fell to the floor.

This leads me into a present mystery. The original ceiling of the sanctuary was beautifully painted with spiritual symbols. The painter came from New York.

Prior to the present ceiling being installed, one of our members, Ernie Lee, photographed these symbols. The photographs have since mysteriously disappeared. The newsletter committee welcomes any information concerning these photographs. Once obtained, the pictures will be gladly shared with all of you.

November 15, 1992 marks the 160th anniversary of FSA. Our beloved former minister, the Very Reverend Angus MacQueen, will help us celebrate.

Many people have come and gone and the political, spiritual and economic challenges have helped to mould us into congregation we are today. Perhaps the words of the Rev Robert Johnston, pastor from 1895 - 1903, best sum it all up: "What changes the years bring."

Marjorie Smith Reaches Out

Marjorie Smith usually has a car load of clothes, a box of baby food or a trunk of chairs and curtains. She's usually on her way to the Food Bank or St. Paul's Daily Bread or delivering items to those in need. She is First-St. Andrew's representative on the Daily Bread board and takes food from our church every Monday. As a member of the Social Action committee, Marjorie gets involved in every project.

What motivates someone like Marjorie to devote so much of herself to the care of others?

"It is a strong desire that comes from within. From the time I was four I wanted to be a nurse. I wanted to help people. I was awarded a scholarship to study music, but nothing could sway me from my desire to be a nurse. I also was interested in doing missionary work in China, but the war prevented that dream from happening."

As a child, Marjorie accompanied her father, a minister in Old Barnes Nova Scotia, on visits to the sick and elderly.

"In the winter, we would take the sleigh and put hot bricks under our feet to keep us warm."

Her parents set an example of giving. "My father and mother had a deep faith, believing that God was always there, and no matter what happened the difficult times would be resolved through faith.

"When I was ten, I remember one Christmas when my parents sat at the kitchen table, so dejected because they had no money. I said to them 'I don't know why you are worried, where is your faith?, we are going to have Christmas, something will happen.' That day a very dear man who was the treasurer of our church arrived with a cheque.

"When I remember that story I think 'the faith of a child shall lead them'.

"When I think back on my father's small salary it is amazing that I didn't feel poor. Even during the depression we always had enough food to feed ourselves and the hungry who came to our home. Our door was always open. Our community was rich in spirit."

Outreach can no longer be done with an open front door, but the giving spirit is still alive.

"It is too bad we need the food banks today. Our society has changed in such a way that we can no longer open our door to the stranger who knocks, so we give in other ways, like the food banks.

"During my time there, [the food banks], I came in contact with many of our new immigrants, most of whom were from Vietnam and Central America. During our conversations I discovered that they had arrived without personal belongings and needed the bare necessities of life. Through requests made within our church we were able to provide beds, furniture, clothing etc. and helped them to establish their homes.

"Through our Social Action committee this work has continued and grown. Our immigrants need more than furniture, they need our friendship in helping them to adjust to a new way of life and learning. Human connection is so important."

Marjorie believes First-St. Andrew's can help make the connection. "Through our visions the church is changing. We are reaching out and we are responsible as a congregation to put our thoughts into action.

"Together we can and are making a difference."

For the Seasons of Lent, Holy Week, Easter

Dear Friends,

We on the staff of First-St. Andrew's are excited about the programs and activities that we have planned for the next three months. On the following pages we have listed Worship Services, Christian Development activities for all ages, special musical events, and many outreach projects in which you can participate. Please take some time to read these pages carefully so that you can make plans for your involvement in the life and work of our congregation.

On March 4th, we begin the season of Lent. This day is known as Ash Wednesday in the Church and we will follow the ancient custom of having an evening service in the chancel with the imposition of ashes and the sacrament of Holy Communion. Lent is a season of 40 days duration. The 40 days remind us of the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, overcoming temptation and preparing for the work that would be his as God's son on earth. For Christians, it is a season of sober reflection on our own lives and for deepening our commitment to God's will for us.

Palm Sunday, April 12th, is the beginning of Holy Week. In Holy Week, we remember the events of the first week of Jesus' life, from His triumphal entry into Jerusalem to His death on the Cross. At First-St. Andrew's, Holy Week is marked by a number of special services and events reminding us that though we fall short of what God requires of us, we are nonetheless forgiven and empowered by God for better things.

Easter Sunday is on April 19th this year. On this very special day, we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The season of Easter continues the mood of celebration for the next 50 days, culminating in the great Festival of Pentecost on June 7th. On this day, God gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church. This year at First-St. Andrew's we will have a service of Confirmation and Holy Communion on the Day of Pentecost.

It is our hope that all of these services and activities will help you to rejoice in your Christian faith, to be renewed in your Christian understanding, and to reach out to others in Christian love.

THE SENIOR CHOIR





Gethsemane Vigil


"Keep awake with me", asks our Lord.

What might we expect to see?

- a) The transition will reflect the results of the visioning process and recommendation of the Restructuring Committee.
- b) Objectives and strategies will be established for each working committee within the church.
- Aberrations of the Official Board system which have unwittingly been implemented over the years will be removed.
- d) Definition will be given to the currently ambiguous FSA characteristics, ie: "Shared Ministry," "Temporal Matters," "Trustee Functions" etc..
- e) Two types of committees will be established within the congregation: i) Standing Committees of the Pastoral Charge; ii) Committees of the Congregation.
- f) A Nomination Committee will work in conjunction with Membership, Volunteer Management, the ministers and the Session electoral process to ensure that individuals from the congregation are given the opportunity to serve on committees for which they are uniquely suited and interested.
- g) The individual committees of the church will appoint representatives (Chairperson) to the Church Council. The Church Council will represent the umbrella organization through which all information will pass; act on and process and process reports; and, thus become the 'court' of the pastoral charge.
- h) The Council system will be put in place a system of democratically elected leaders in all aspects of church life.
- i) Committees will be empowered with the confidence and trust of the congregation and a clear job description of the actual responsibilities assumed and the decisionmaking process expected. Relevant committees with known and understood policies of accountability and responsibility will report to the Church Council on the success of the implementation of their individual missions.
- j) There will be no ambiguity about who is responsible for what function within the congregation - specific terms of reference will be given to each committee.
- k) The Council system will provide checks and balances for the tasks that are left undone or tasks assigned to people who have resigned, died or moved with a clear mechanism in place to fill vacancies.
- The Council is ultimately accountable to the congregation for: roles set out in the Manual, organization, membership, care and oversight of the spiritual and temporal interests of the congregation, defining the roles of the ministers, defining the roles of

Guidelines for Structural Renewal

Following many meetings of the restructuring committee constituted to carry out the structural review, some general principles came into focus. These include:

- Change should come about only after the entire congregation and all committees and those affected by the change had a <u>full and candid</u> <u>opportunity</u> to review, evaluate, and participate in the process of change and the ultimate recommendation;
- The unity of congregational purpose found in our mission statement would be recognized in a new unified Board;
- The new structure should <u>bridge the spiritual and temporal activities of the church</u> within a single unified congregational council the symbol of community!
- The concept of eldership should be preserved;
- All functions required to be undertaken by a United Church Pastoral Charge pursuant to the terms of the *Manual* must be recognized;
- Individual 'working' committees should not be tampered with in the functions they perform unless by their initiative;
- There would be <u>no deviation from the</u> doctrines of The United Church of Canada.

related groups and activities within the church, and providing a mechanism for recognition.

Committee Structure

- a) The congregation elects a Nominating Committee and Board of Trustees
- b) The Nominating Committee consults widely within the church and recommends the election of specific individuals to specific committees
- c) Related committees are aligned under an <u>Umbrella</u> <u>Committee</u> which elects a Chairperson representing it on the Church Council
- d) Reporting and accountable to the congregation, the Church Council acts as the ultimate authority, incorporating the former authority of bodies such as the Session, Stewardship, Stewards, Memorials, Ministry and Personnel. The net result is one congregation - one Ministry. The work of the Council will bring together the work of the committees within the congregation.

ADDING ACCESSIBILITY

Anyone who has renovated knows how a small idea can grow into a major project. When the dust and clamor settles, the result can cause homeowners to wonder how they coped before and why it wasn't done sooner.


The congregation is in a similar position. After several studies, it was clear that a more accessible entry was needed.

"The idea has been a recurring one at the church over the years," said Russ Gonder. "It came forward to Stewards as a major item to be addressed. As a consequence of that, a plan was put into place to develop a specific and concrete plan."

An ad hoc committee within Stewards approached Russ Scorgie to consult with an elevator supplier. He also reviewed the responses to questionnaires filed for John Eberhard, to get a feel for all the needs.


"It started off as strictly accessibility," said Scorgie. But he realized congestion and poor security could also be addressed.

Installing a new entrance where the two buildings join solves several problems. Security would improve because the door would be within sight of the office. The bottleneck of levels and stairs could be relieved and the location is central.




"It will give a business entrance to the church that will be an active entrance," said Gonder. "There will be a sense of arrival."

"We don't want it to feel like a back entrance, but more formal," added Scorgie.

The location provides convenient access to the lower hall, youth room and parlor, as well as the sanctuary. Future development of the property is not limited. "Doing something there doesn't cut off possibilities of doing other things later on," said Scorgie.

"At this point we haven't fully studied everything. We didn't want to go too far with it before going to the congregation."

Congregational approval was given at the annual meeting in January. The project now moves from the concept to design stage. Two committees are to form. An advisory committee is to include three Stewards, three members of Session, one Trustee and two general members, one of whom is physically challenged. The other committee is to head fundraising.

Treasurer's Report
