MARGARET HAMILTON REMEMBERS

Margaret (McQueen) Hamilton came to FSA as a child in 1929. Her parents, Myrtle and Jack, with sister Beverley, got involved when she and her sister joined Mrs. Wheeler's children's choir and Myrtle became a 25 year member of the Senior Choir. Marg remembers weekly Bible memory work to give recitations to Miss Howie, as well as her CGIT group with Jean Hair, presenting the drama Dream of

Queen Esther, directed by Mrs. MacGregor.


Marg was confirmed at age 12. At age 17 as a member of the Young People's Bible Class with Mrs. Wheable, Marg and some of her cohorts used to sneak in to the sanctuary after class to play the organ. The youth group used to go to Dance Clubs after their meetings as dancing International Yewas not an approved church activity. In 1930 Marg went to a Church Board Meeting to request permission for dancing in the church. It was approved and many attended.

When Marg joined FSA the Sanctuary had a U shaped loft all the way around and the choir and pipe organ were at the front. She remembers everyone being amazed at how big the window in the chancel was when the organ was moved. Marg has vivid memories of each of the stained glass windows being installed and dedicated. She so enjoyed these and all the other symbols of the church, including the original painted ceilings, that Marg researched and gave several presentations about their meanings.

FSA was very involved in the community and Marg remembers over 200 people being housed in the Church during the flood of 1937. Each family was given a Sunday School classroom to live in and her mother, Myrtle, and other members of the church helped prepare meals and entertain the children.

Another memory for Marg that had a deep impact was the weekly reading of the names of those lost during World War II. She knew many of these young men. During this time she met Roy Hamilton and they were married in FSA in 1945. A favourite memory is a picture of them signing the register with their images reflected in

a beautiful shining table in the Church Parlour. All four of their daughters were married in FSA and had the same picture taken at the same table.

Marg and Roy had six children, all baptized at FSA. Spence, their eldest, and Marg's father died in 1951. They dedicated a brass Flower Urn with an inscription to their memory that is still used for arrangements in the church. Myrtle died in 1953.

The other five children, Anne, Laurel, Sue, John and Bev were confirmed at FSA. Anne was one of the first Teen Elders. Bev and her cousin David Colwell ran Youth Parliament from FSA once.

Marg now has nine grandchildren. The oldest three, Matthew,

Bobby and Michelle, were baptized together. Three others, Adam, Sarah and Elinor, were baptized at FSA later. Spence, Laura and Elise, have all enjoyed FSA Sunday School when they were home to visit Grammie.

Matthew and Adam Slomer have been confirmed and of Older Persons 1999 are fourth generation members. Marg's husband, Roy, who was an elder for 25 years, died in 1998 and a moving

service was held at FSA. (I remember that Mum was surprised at how many people came to the funeral, but as I review their lives and service at FSA it was no surprise to me.)

Marg has been somewhat limited by her kidney failure and subsequent dialysis, but she is still a valuable, active, well-loved member of FSA. It is long term membership of Marg and many others like her that give us the rich history and continued living resource that is First-St. Andrew's.

LINDA BADKE REACHES OUT WITH ELUCOC

A member of First-St. Andrew's since 1985, Linda Badke has remained active with strong commitment to community outreach programs. She previously chaired the Social Action Committee, and for the past three years has been the chair of the ELUCOC (East London United Church Outreach Cluster) board.

Linda speaks of ELUCOC with great passion and hopes to increase awareness in others. Originally

ELUCOC included four East London churches (Gethsemane, Rowntree, Richard's, Siloam), but now has expanded to include a total of eight churches (Robinson, First-St. Andrew's, Dorchester, St. Lawrence Presbyterian). The ELUCOC board meets once a month and allows two board members from each church. Lyn Carapella is the other board member representing FSA. There is a fund-raising subcommittee to support outreach workers. ELUCOC employs two part-time workers, Carol Langford in the Marconi Cascade Community, and the Rev. Susan Eagle in the Huron Heights area. They play an active role in community programs and provide crisis intervention.

A United Way grant supports several of ELUCOC's programs hosted in the Marconi Street Community (a small London-Middlesex community with subsidized housing for the working poor and folks requiring welfare assistance). Carol Langford hosts an after school program for children in grades 1 - 5. There the children read with an adult, play board games and do crafts. There is a preschool program with crafts, story and playtime. A preteen cooking program helps to get children at par with the reading skills of their peers. Helen Mahabir runs a teen program to teach leadership skills, decision making and organizational skills, while keeping the kids off the streets.

Additional programs offered by ELUCOC include a nutritious hot meal for \$1.00 enjoyed by 80 - 100 people at noon on Wednesdays. Mary Mount hosts a story and craft for preschoolers. The Catholic School Board teaches English as a second language. Thursday evenings folks can participate in BINGO night.

It's fortunate that through the programs it offers, ELUCOC is able to reach out to the community and provide opportunities that are vital to the growth of life skills in these individuals. Without ELUCOC, members of the community would not be able to afford the luxury of participating in extra curricular programs. Thank you ELUCOC and to all those who support it.






COUNCIL REPORTS TO YOU

- On September 14, we had a fully attended meeting that got down to, and through a lot of business.
- Heather Bedford introduced one of the four student nurses from the UWO School of Nursing, who have been attached to Heather as clinical apprentices in the realm of Pastoral Nursing.
- The key members of the Bill Watson Sanctuary Renovation Team were recognised and listed. Each of them will receive an individual letter of acknowledgement and thanks for their outstanding contribution of time, effort, skill and expertise in this gloriously successful undertaking.



- A possible change in the timing of Sunday morning services was discussed. There was virtually unanimous agreement that all of the Council Committees be asked to consider the feasibility of a change to 9 a.m. for the early service, and 10:30 a.m. for the main service.
- The desirability of planning a Millennium Eve Service was discussed and overwhelmingly rejected.
- Some of the key changes inherent in the current proposals for a major reorganisation of the administrative structure of the United Church were explained.
