FIFTY YEARS OF SERVICE

If you look around the church on a Sunday morning, you may not see Lee and Russ Gonder, but they are almost certainly in attendance. Try checking the balcony, their favourite location for worship, and you will find them seated with several other balcony

regulars. From this vantage point they are able to see the organ and the choir, as well as the chancel area.

The Gonders have been associated with FSA for over fifty years, Russ joining Lee here after their marriage in 1948. They have been involved in most facets of church life during those years and have seen many changes.

When their children were young, Lee worked in the nursery for twelve years and Russ helped with Cubs and Scouts, eventually taking over as leader at FSA. Russ served as an elder for many years and also joined the Property Committee, bringing with him the skills he had used in his career with buildings at Western.

In answer to complaints about lack of accessibility to FSA, Russ joined Bill Minion and Russ Scorgie in drafting a proposal for an access addition. It was an exciting and challenging task, and since it involved substantial expenditure, one to be

considered carefully. Given the choice of providing a merely adequate new entrance, or spending a little more to create a first-rate addition, the committee chose quality, and produced the functional and beautiful addition of which we are so proud.

Russ is now a member of the Board of Trustees, involved in managing funds left to the church through estates, and establishing the Vision Fund as a vehicle for donations. His work is not confined to the area of finance however. Russ has willingly served meals at Out of the Cold, taken photos of the sanctuary renovation and helped out at the Holly Bazaar.

Likewise, Lee's activities over the years have been wide-ranging.

She and Connie Murray teamed up to organize all the food served at Out of the Cold during its early years. As well, Lee has been known to wash and mend jeans for some of the guests on those Monday nights. In earlier years, Lee worked with the Junior Choir helping with makeup or costumes for such musicals as *Noye's Fludde* and *The Friendly Giant*. As a member of the music committee she provided food for receptions after Senior Choir concerts. She goes where she is needed, whether it be to arrange flowers for the

sanctuary, assist with the Rummage Sale and Bazaar, assemble layettes for new mothers, or light candles for the Christmas Eve service. Lee is a long-term member of the Thursday evening UCW unit.

Both Lee and Russ mention the wonderful people they have met at FSA and express appreciation for the support they have provided over the years. Russ is especially impressed with the way FSA adapts to challenging situations, often providing developmental programs as a healthy means of dealing with issues.

For their long and committed service to the smooth running of FSA, we sincerely thank Lee and Russ Gonder.

FROM THE PARISH NURSE

This is the first in a series of articles that will appear in Tidings with the goal of further educating the congregation regarding the role of the Parish Nurse and also doing some health teaching on my part. When I first became the Parish Nurse the focus seemed to be on the elderly and shut-in population; however, gradually members of all ages have come to me with concerns either with their own health or that of a family member. I want to hear from anyone, any age with concerns. If I do not have the answer, I will get information for you or point you to where you can find the information. If you have topics you would like featured in my column, please let me know.

Since January was Alzheimer Awareness Month I wanted to touch on that subject and Caregiver stress that goes hand in hand with Alzheimer's. The Alzheimer Society of London and Middlesex publishes quarterly newsletters, which have valuable information about various aspects of Alzheimer's. I have a copy of one if you would like to see it. The Alzheimer Society is working with the city of London to develop a "Memory Lane" in Springbank Park that will include a commemorative wall. This wall will mark "brick by brick" the engraved names of community

members who wish to show support or remember a loved one. From the Alzheimer's newsletter comes this poignant article:

TEN REQUESTS FROM A PERSON WITH ALZHEIMER DISEASE

- 1. Be patient with me remember I am the helpless victim of an organic brain disease which is out of control.
- 2. Talk to me even though I cannot always answer you, I can hear your voice and sometimes I can comprehend your words.
- 3. Be kind to me for each day of my life is a long and desperate struggle. Your kindness may be the most special event of the day.
- 4. Consider my feelings for they are still very much alive within me.
- 5. Treat me with human dignity and respect as I would have gladly treated you if you had been the victim lying in this bed.
- 6. Remember my past for I was once a healthy, vibrant person full of life, love and laughter, with abilities and intelligence.
- 7. Remember my present I am a fearful person, a loving husband, wife, father, mother, grandfather, grandmother, aunt, uncle or dear friend who misses my home and family very much.
- 8. Remember my future though it may seem bleak to you, I am always filled with the hope of tomorrow.
- 9. Pray for me for I am the person who lingers in the mists that drift between time and eternity. Your presence may do more for me than any other outreach of compassion you could extend to me.
- 10. Love me and the gifts of love you give will be a blessing from which we will fill both our lives with light forever.

I know there are caregivers who are stressed for a variety of reasons. I would like to form a small group for caregivers but I need to know you are interested. If you are a caregiver who has found an appropriate support group I would like to hear from you as well, as the more resources I know of, the more I can help others. Thanks!

COUNCIL REPORTS TO YOU

A lot has happened since the last report.

The Joint Needs Assessment Committee (JNAC), which was formed to initiate the process of finding Frank Meadows' successor, held its first meeting on January 17, met frequently thereafter, received oral and written submissions, and considered carefully their import. Its report, with recommendations, has been presented to Council for approval, and will be presented to the Congregation for its

endorsement, with the goal of submitting it to the M.P.&E. Committee of Presbytery at its meeting on April 12. The expectation is that the report will be received and a vacancy declared. Meanwhile, in anticipation of this outcome, the Nominating Committee at FSA is working on the creation of a Search Committee and will come to the congregation for endorsement as soon as this is procedurally permissible.

The decision to hold congregational meetings in the lower hall has proven to be a wise one. It is evident that this fosters free and frank discussion, partly because participants feel less inhibited and partly because the sound system is more compliant. This practice will be continued.

Ken Wright's budget presentation at the Annual General Meeting was clearly outlined and well received, in spite of the fact that the bottom line indicated a deficit. To my mind what this represents is a faith congregation willing to take risks, particularly with respect to the appointment of a Community Development Coordinator. It is a great pleasure to announce that Ted Kostecki, one of our own members, has been chosen and will start on May 1. Jean Wright, Russ Knight and the selection committee deserve our warm thanks and appreciation for the diligence and care they brought to their task.

The questionnaire regarding the timing of worship services, which had been circulated as a 'feeler', generated a response which warranted a more in-depth study. This is being undertaken by the Worship Committee which will report its findings, with recommendations, to the April meeting of Council.

On February 29, Heather, Frank and I participated as invited speakers at a Town Hall meeting on Parish Nursing held at St. Joseph's Hospital. The timeliness and success of this ministry at FSA is clearly creating considerable interest.

Finally, a word of thanks and acknowledgement to Ed Ellis, our industrious and devoted gardener and groundskeeper, who for reasons of time and distance needs to modify his services. An illuminated certificate of appreciation was presented to him at the 11 a.m. service on March 12.

The theme of this year's stewardship campaign was Thank You for Making the Difference. Perhaps you were fortunate to catch the minute for mission series with reflections from Nikki Attwell. Jean Comfort, Betty Anne Younker, Ted Kostecki, Nancy Howard and Kevin Johnston. Some of you will not have



had the opportunity to capture the heartfelt enthusiasm generated in the testimonies of individuals, who themselves make a profound difference at FSA. Space restrictions in Tidings do not allow us to share their words in entirety, but we hope to reach a wider audience with excerpts of their messages.

As Ted points out, the campaign was "designed to recognize what each of us here has done in developing and nurturing the success of the church." The individuals giving the minutes were of all ages and came to FSA at different stages in their lives. At one extreme, Jean came 60+ years ago, Ted was married in our sanctuary 25 years prior, while Nikki arrived only 5 years ago. Yet there is a common thread in their reflections of what makes FSA an inviting church.

God is with us everywhere, not just at church, but how fortunate we are to have this beautiful building to worship and praise God. Jean has been here long enough to remember the sanctuary back to its first major renovation. Ted does not forget to remind us "how grateful we need to be to those who preceded us and whose gifts provided the stained glass and renovations."

Perhaps this group is from a biased sample, with music programs being their first drawing card to the church. Still I dare say no one will dispute Nikki's comment that "our ministry of music is without equal in this city." Betty Anne adds that "Through music we are able to delve into a part of our being that may result in a musical experience, a spiritual experience, or a mixture of both, intertwined and connected, and extremely powerful."

Christians bring to church a set of spiritual and social needs that must be met. While music was the admittance ticket, it was a combination of other gifts offered in this congregation that influenced the decision to return and to share in this church home. Her thoughts echoed by the others, Jean summarizes, "It was the

opportunity for growth and enrichment through participation, and under excellent leadership that kept me here."

FSA offers a wide selection of programs that encourage spiritual growth and fellowship. Nikki and Betty Anne mentioned all of the music programs. Kevin, Ted and Jean spoke of church school, youth retreats, social groups, study groups, and membership on committees. "And from each of these moments that you and I have shared," reflects Ted, "we've all taken something away from each other."

No church could hold its membership without strong leadership. Nikki and Kevin both appreciate that "We don't shy away from the tough questions" and, "Often we have taken risks and walked new and different paths."

Most agree that "strong pulpit presence is necessary in leadership." But the demands on the clergy don't stop there. They must prepare sermons with dynamic preaching style, content and doctrinal teaching. In addition, they must generate enthusiasm, show compassion, and demonstrate and encourage spiritual depth. They must balance the needs of the congregation with the ministry of outreach. They alone are held accountable for everything associated with the name of their church. Only God could fill the expectations we create. In spite of that, strong leadership is evident at FSA. "The vision of faith is projected in sermons with skillful weave of storytelling," as Ted and Nikki attest. Kevin declares, "We have been blessed with very gifted clergy who have inspired and challenged us." That is the true role of the clergy.

FSA has much to offer to help individuals experience God's presence. When all is said and done, nothing will substitute for the enthusiasm members have for Christian faith. Despite its large size, everyone agreed, "This congregation offers warmth

and nurturing in an inclusive community," and atmosphere that can only arise from the excitement of the Spirit working in us. A recent sermon ended, "Perhaps the best thing we can do then, is to receive God's gifts, all of them, and use them in God's service." Making the difference.



UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA - 75 YEARS YOUNG

This year marks the 75th anniversary of church union, which included Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian churches.

Wanting to gain a little more insight into this event I had a visit with Jean Gorwill, a longtime member of First-St. Andrew's. Jean was very helpful in filling me in on how things changed and how people felt about the changes.

Before church union, two women's organizations existed, each of which had distinctly different responsibilities in the church. The Ladies' Aid, after church union,

became the Women's Association and in 1962 joined with the Women's Missionary Society to create the United Church Women,

with a great variety of duties. When the church union was in progress, Jean was attending university, but she remembers her parents' attending the large service at Mutual St. Arena in Toronto. Many Presbyterian churches, about 34%, were not in favour of the

union. Six members of session at New St. James Presbyterian Church withdrew to St. Andrew's and became members there in 1926. In many cases, between the Presbyterian and now United churches, unpleasant situations arose between friends and neighbours which took a considerable time to amend.

When sharing her thoughts with me, this quotation from the Wesley Memorial in

Westminster Abbey came to mind: "The best of all is God is with us. I look upon all the world as my parish."
