At least three committees are weighing the pros and cons of making an adjustment in the times of Sunday services and Sunday morning Christian Development programs. Stewardship and Long-Range Planning Working Together

I have just browsed through a book recommended by Frank Meadows, entitled *Twelve Keys to an Effective Church* by Kenneth L. Callahan and published by Harper and Row Publishers, San Francisco. This book has been used in the past as resource material by the Vision Committee.

The author contends that if churches expect to be effective in mission and successful in outreach, they must have a long-range plan. (It should be noted that the Stewardship Committee is responsible for long-range planning, developing and keeping up-to-date goals and a mission statement for First-St. Andrew's.) This year the committee will be reviewing the mission statement and considering whether or not it should be revised.

Although the twelve keys were thoroughly developed to assist a congregation in planning renewal, I found a rather interesting approach outlined in the Introduction to be worth sharing.

Callahan's strategy is to determine the strengths of the congregation and then consider how these strengths can be expanded or added. He writes, "Once a congregation has

claimed its strengths, it is strategic that it decide on new ways to expand these strengths. It is decisive in successful long-range planning that a congregation build on its strengths, not its weaknesses. When a church expands its strengths, gifts, graces and talents, it becomes more effective in missions. When it becomes preoccupied with its weaknesses, it begins to lose its strengths. Strengths that are not used, weaken and decay."

In an effort to determine the fundamental strengths that generate vitality in church life at First-St. Andrew's, one would have to consider the three T's -- time, talent and treasure. These three components are tightly woven into a membership work force that results in effective Christian service.

We need only examine our weekly bulletin of announcements to conclude that we have a dedicated congregation of individuals who have made a commitment of time and talent to the life of the church.

A challenge to build on these strengths has become more evident in recent months. We must continue to do more to attract potential members to our church. We must do more to provide easy access to our facilities for *all* of our members.

The investment of time and talent by our Vision Committee and our Access Committee has resulted in a proposal to resolve the major problems of easy access and to enhance our church property at the same time. The proposal was adopted by the congregation at the last annual meeting.

Such an ambitious project would not be possible without the third component -- treasure. Once again, the members of the congregation are showing evidence of building on strengths. The financial pledges have been forthcoming in a very supportive manner.

Early visionaries at First-St. Andrew's have made a significant investment in terms of time, talent and treasure in order that we may experience ongoing spiritual growth in a facility that is conducive to worship and service to the community.

Similarly, it is necessary for our present congregation, through the process of long-term planning, to continue to maintain a fitting vision for the future. In that way, we generate a legacy that will enrich the lives of those in this congregation for years to come.

Environment Tips

An aggressive program is underway to allow construction to start in June for completion in fall 93. Competitive bids will be obtained from a number of prequalified contractors as soon as detailed drawings are completed. Following receipt of these bids, a full congregational meeting will be convened to approve the plan, budget, and contractor.

The past month has been a busy one for the architect and his staff, who are completing all the design details for construction. No drawings exist for the existing buildings, so detailed investigations and measurements must be made of all areas where connections will occur between old and new structures.

Final design work has been carried out in consultation with many groups to gain their advice, and to insure that most needs will be met. Drawings have been on display at coffee and conversation for information and comments. Our Council reviewed the design at their meeting of May 11th.

The fundraising program is progressing with remarkable success. This congregation has again shown its compassion for others through their generous support of this initiative. The support has come from all segments of the congregation.



Living with a Teenager and Enjoying it!

Coming this fall at FSA: an exciting new video-based program called "Active Parenting of Teens." Based on the successful Active Parenting Discussion Program, this new course focuses exclusively on teens and the special challenges and issues presented to their parents - that's you and me!

Based on practical psychology theories, *Active Parenting of Teens* addresses difficult subjects while building a firm foundation on the principles of cooperation, courage, responsibility, good communication skills and discipline. The information and skills taught are designed to help parents of teens (and any adults who regularly interact with teens), learn how to deal more effectively with young adults in this phase of their lives, especially coping with behaviour problems or sensitive topics.

We are fortunate to have Charlotte and Bill Oldham as co-leaders for this group. As many of you know, as well as being excellent facilitators, the Oldhams have plenty of experience in living with teens both in and outside of the home. Their enthusiasm for this topic insures that participants can look forward to an enjoyable and rewarding experience.

The program consists of six sessions each lasting about two hours. It is being offered at no charge, except for the possible cost of a personal <u>Parent Guide</u>. We are planning to run the program once a week, in the evening, during September and October.
