#### Child Poverty Action Group

Members of First-St. Andrew's are joining the battle against child poverty. "I know that this may sound pie in the sky, but our goal is the elimination of child poverty by the year 2000," says Barb Plante, chairperson and founder of the Child Poverty Action Group (CPAG) of London. "In the past three years the number of children in Ontario living in poverty has doubled to 403,000. Children are our biggest natural resource, and they deserve much better."

Barb explained that her inspiration for this major undertaking came from the visioning process our congregation has been dedicated to. Committees were challenged to dream big, imaging projects in keeping with our motto "Renew, Rejoice, Reach Out!"

Barb, Deborah Carter, Sue Scorgie with important help from Dr. Barry Evans, brought together London's agencies serving children. The new group is dedicated to addressing the fundamental issue of poverty in our community. Rather than to run a food program in one of our schools, they want to affect municipal, provincial and federal programs to combat the root causes poverty....p.2

#### **New Visiting Minister**

Reverend Herb Wonfor loves his work visiting members of our congregation whose health makes it difficult or impossible to get to church. "Visiting for First-St. Andrew's, I meet so many interesting people. We often share stories from our experience."

Herb has a long history as a minister, having been ordained in 1952. He has served in small towns and large cities in many parts of Canada. His first charge was in Peace River, Alberta, close to the border of Northwest Territories. Montreal-Ottawa, Toronto and London Conferences have at various times had his service. Now, two days a week, Reverend Wonfor visits some of the over 70 people in our congregation who need a visit. Visits vary in length according to the desires of the individual, often lasting about half an hour. It is planned that communion will be available in the New Year to those requesting it. "These are people who have preceded us to build and maintain the traditions of First-St.Andrew's. They deserve our care."

# Restructuring Our Church Government

In 1984, the General Council of our national church released a study describing several effective structures of church government. Over time, the roles of many churches' members, officers, ministers and committees had departed from their traditional functions in the Official Board Structure outlined at Union in 1925. New standard structures needed to be defined.

We, too, have deviated from the old Official Board structure. At the annual meeting this year we agreed to an ad-hoc structure for a new Finance Committee. Our Memorials Committee, along with some others, does not fit the traditional Official Board description.


There are signs that our current structure is problematic both for members at large and for officers of the church. The visioning process found that members at large desire more openness in church government. Many of our volunteer church officers are frustrated by the repetitious meeting and reporting at various levels of the committee structure. The efficiency and effectiveness of our present system is indeed questionable.

The Official Board executive believes it timely to review the options and seriously consider structural change. Not change for the sake of change, but rather, to greatly improve our present level of effectiveness.

I believe it is important to gather the leadership of the church into a singular Unified Board or Council. This would symbolize the unity of the congregation, improve efficiency, ensure confidentiality and provide the desired simplicity of organizations.

If these changes appear desirable, at the same time we must: find an acceptable way of preserving the timetested concept of "eldership"; address the roles of our full time staff (our clear expectations, a well articulated personnel policy); maintain the functions designated traditionally for Session, Stewards, Stewardship, Ministry & Personnel and Trustees; be guided by the articulated vision now manifest in our mission strategy.


It is hoped that a recommendation for structural change can be made at the Annual Meeting in January. Perhaps a period of experimentation will give us a sense for the viability of the new structure? In any event, the congregation will be kept informed of our progress and naturally, will have the final say on any change to be implemented. In the meantime, any observations or recommendations by any member would be most welcome.



#### MUSIC

The Music Ministry puts faith into action as it serves the congregation, reaches out to the community, and develops a bond of love and spiritual growth among its participants. Consider the many opportunities to Rejoice with us at First-St. Andrew's in 1991/1992.

There's nothing that expresses the joy of Christmastide better than the music of the season. All of the musical groups in our church are already preparing for the services in Advent, Christmas and Epiphany.

### The Senior Choir

The Advent Service of Lessons and Carols is always a highlight for the choir and congregation. The Senior Choir will sing a variety of carols and other selections at this service and during December. On Sunday, December 22, we will sing a wonderful contemporary work, David Pinkham's "Christmas Cantata" accompanied by a brass quartet. At the Christmas Eve Communion Service we plan to repeat last year's premiere of Stephen Adams' "Christmas Mass," written especially for us.

#### The Teen Choir

The Teen Choir, under the direction of Heather Shadgett our vocal scholar, will participate in the Advent Lessons and Carols Service and will provide music for the CGIT Candlelighting Service at 9:15 a.m. on December 8.

Beginning in January, the choir will begin preparing the musical "Clowns" for performance sometime in May. Participation in this musical is open to all the youth of the church and it's our hope to get as many of our young people involved as possible.

#### The Gone Fishing Choir

As well as singing at the Advent Lessons and Carol Service, the Gone Fishing Choir will provide the musical leadership at the 7:00 p.m. Christmas Eve Family Service. When activities begin in January, work will commence on the annual musical which has become a highlight of the program's activities.

#### The Handbell Choirs

All of our handbell choirs will be participating in worship services during the season. The Mixed Pealers will ring on November 24 and the Teen Ringers on December 22. The Ladies Handbell Choir will ring at the Advent Lessons and Carols Service and with the help of the Teen Ringers will perform the second of our Advent Noon Recitals on December 6. A special event these groups have undertaken is a concert in Dorchester on Sunday, November 24 for the Mossley Heritage Society.

#### Instrumental Music

A number of instrumentalist from the congregation will share their talents with us during December and January. We are especially looking forward to the music the brass quartet will play on December 22.

An exciting new group has been started by Bruce Richardson in the last few weeks. Bruce is directing a string orchestra open to all teens and adults who play an orchestral string instrument. Although a "pilot project" at the moment, it is our hope that this group will flourish and become a regular part of the music program of FSA. 

#### What is this Decade everyone is referring to?

The Ecumenical Decade of Churches in Solidarity with Women. The World Council of Churches has declared 1988-1998 as the Decade, and our National Church has determined that this topic will be the focus of our Mission study for the next two years. Churches need to address the issues which continue to keep women from full participation in church and society.

# Don't you think a "Decade" makes too much of the situation of women in our society?

No. Lets look at some statistics:

1 out of every 10 women in Canada is physically abused by her partner – some feel this is a conservative estimate and that 1 in 6 reflects a more accurate number.

In 1987, 59% of Canadian adults living in poverty were women — despite the increased participation of women in the labour force. 57% of single-parent families headed by women in 1987, lived below the poverty line.

#### MISSION STUDY THEME 1991-1992

Worldwide, women do 70% of the manual labour but only own 1% of the world's property.

#### What can we do here at First-St.Andrew's?

First of all, we must improve our awareness of the issues which impact on the lives of women both within our church, and within our society. We must be willing to educate ourselves both individually and collectively.

A few ideas to start with:

- go to the church library and look for the section on Decade Resources. Try: the mission study on how media affect our perceptions of women, Women In Transition, a women's bible study; the list of Decade resources. There is much more!
- are you inclusive in your own use of language?
- learn about women's issues and how they effect both men and women.

The Mission Education Committee and The Ecumenical Decade Committee request that you spend some time contemplating the issues affecting the lives of millions of women in Canada and abroad. We can make changes for the better.
