Bill Watson and Barbara Plante are co-chairs of the recently established Out of the Cold (OOTC) program through which First-St. Andrew's provided shelter for the homeless one night a week. The program operated from February 19 until March 25.

The roots for Barbara Plante's interest in helping others can be found in her childhood. Growing up in Winnipeg as the daughter and granddaughter of United Church ministers, she gained a strong sense of the importance of mission work. In fact, her education began in her grandfather's mission in the north end of the city. She was also influenced by the work her father did with young offenders in Winnipeg and later in Kitchener.

As a teenager Barbara seriously considered overseas mission work, but an untimely illness prevented her from following through with it. When her father's ministry brought him to London, she often accompanied him to the Men's Mission where she sang or played the piano for the residents.

Later, as a high school teacher in Toronto, she did volunteer work with street youth, helping to provide fellowship and an evening program one night per week.

With her return to London came marriage to Bob and the birth of their two sons, Adam and Adrian. Bob's sabbatical in 1977 provided an opportunity for the family to live in England and develop a taste for travel. In recent years, Barbara and Bob have visited Japan and Greece, and are looking forward to a trip to Italy in May.

Barbara's desire to help the less fortunate continued to develop.

She became active in FSA's sponsorship of a Vietnamese family in the 1980s and from there moved to ELUCOC (East London United Church Outreach Cluster) where she is currently chair of fundraising.

Barbara is also director of the Laudamus Handbell Choir, a member of the FSA choir and the Social Action Committee. It was through the Social Action Committee that she first became aware of Frank Meadows' interest in establishing a shelter for the homeless. Believing that she could make a contribution in such a venture, she contacted Bill Watson, and together they began planning the *Out of the Cold* program. Within a month FSA opened its doors to its first Monday evening guests.

Barbara reports that an evaluation of the program took place in April, and Council subsequently passed a resolution to continue OOTC in the fall. Meetings with other downtown churches will take place in the near future. In the meantime, Barbara will take a short break from her church work and enjoy her holiday in Italy.

Bill Watson

Bill Watson has always been actively involved in the service of others in both his professional and private life. Born and educated in Glasgow, Scotland, he graduated in medicine in 1950 and served as an army medical officer in Hong Kong before returning to Scotland to complete his internship. After he and Elspeth were married, they moved to Washington and then to Kenya where Bill taught at the medical school for one year.

Shortly after his arrival in London in 1969, he joined First-St. Andrew's and quickly became involved in the life and fellowship of the church. Some of Bill's contributions include participation in FSA music and

drama programs, and a leadership role in the Stewardship Committee.

His most recent project has been the *Out of the Cold* program which he helped launch in February 1996. With the tremendous amount of interest shown in the project by other city churches, Bill envisions the program expanding to several nights per week next winter

Recently retired from medicine, Bill finds that he has more time to relax and enjoy the pursuits he is involved in. His leisure activities have now become an integral part of his day. His interest in drama has led him to the London Community Players where he is a member of the play-reading committee. He is also editor of the London Academy of Medicine newsletter and chair of the Division of World Outreach of Middlesex Presbytery.

Future plans include a June trip to Alaska and the Northwest Territories with Elspeth, and the possibility of a short-term teaching assignment in Kuala Lumpur at the end of the year. Until then, Bill will be busy with golf, squash, reading, and gardening in addition to frequent visits with his children and grandchildren.



CHURCH OPENS DOORS TO HOMELESS Letter to the Editor (London Free Press)

Recently, my church began a program called Out of the Cold. Let me tell you a little about my church.

To the best of my knowledge, not a single one of its parishioners has ever required such a service. In fact, many have never experienced the side of society that deals with hunger, homelessness and loss of hope. This year, however, they identified a need in our society. For that reason, I am proud to be associated with and to be a member of First-St. Andrew's United Church in London.

On Feb. 19, we opened our doors for the first time to London's homeless. The response was good. Those who attended were served soup and sandwiches. A social hour followed and we later settled down to watch a movie. More remarkable, however, were the volunteers who arrived to help. They were from all walks of life. In many cases, all they had in common was their knowledge of the need for a sanctuary, however temporary, for some individuals and their strong desire to help. The tone of the evening was nonjudgmental. There were no religious overtones, just a community providing for its own.

Most striking was the number of people who came to help, but had no prior experience with life on the streets. They were nervous and cautious and seemed to feel unqualified because of their lack of exposure to a side of life they knew nothing about.

These difficulties were overcome by our guests, who proved themselves dignified and respectful. In the weeks to come, we may deal with different, more demanding sectors of society. But we've been initiated. We know we can deal with whatever comes our way because the bottom line is that we are all human beings struggling to find our place in society. For some of us, the struggle has been more difficult. My church is non-judgmental, my church is lending a hand and that is why my heart bursts with pride when I think about First-St. Andrew's and the generosity that exists within its walls.

On Sunday, March 10, we heard the first performance of an anthem, written for the Senior Choir, in memory of Kevin Kossatz, our former tenor soloist. - many children in Trinidad and Tobago are unable to attend school because of unsafe buildings, inadequate water supply, and lack of space?
- √ 300,000 people were left homeless in a matter of seconds as an earthquake struck Kobe, Japan on January 17, 1995 at 5:46 a.m.?

Did you know that the United Church of Canada is working to make a difference in these situations and many, many others? There are Canadians at work in Brazil working with the children and providing an opportunity for education on health care, nutrition, budgeting and family planning. There are Canadians in Trinidad and Tobago teaching carpentry and water management. The United Church of Canada provided emergency aid almost immediately to the people of Kobe, Japan.

It is the role of the Mission and Service Committee to enlighten the whole congregation about the work that is done by our national church throughout the world. We try to do this in a number of ways.

On many occasions throughout the year, a member of our committee will provide a Minute for Mission just before the 11:00 a.m. worship service. This time is used to bring you up-to-date on ongoing activities sponsored by the M & S Fund or introduce a new project. Often a related video presentation is featured in the Lower Hall during Coffee and Conversation.

One of the bulletin boards in the Lower Hall features articles, items of interest, letters and pictures related to the projects of the Mission and Service Fund and London Conference. This display is changed on a regular basis and we invite you to take a look.

The Mission and Service Committee also sponsors the Observer subscription campaign each April. This United Church publication provides news from across the country and often features news from mission projects. *Mandate*, the United Church's Mission

Traditionally, each fall, a Sunday Service has been designated as Mission Sunday. The Mission and Service Committee is responsible for securing a special speaker for the worship service on that day. Careful planning and considerable organization goes into these services.

Each year, the Committee tries to feature a specific project or country where United Church development work is being carried out. Over the past several years, Committee members have taken this responsibility one step further and have provided a lunch following the Mission Sunday Service featuring ethnic food and an opportunity to visit with our guest speaker. These lunches have been very well received and funds generated from them have been applied to our Mission and Service Fund contribution.

For the past several years, the Mission and Service Committee has channelled your contributions to Overseas Relief (special envelopes used on Communion Sundays) to sponsor a project in Wake Tyo, Ethiopia. This project has been very successful and is now a model for other communities in the area. The people of Wake Tyo now have a good supply of fresh water and are successfully farming. They are taking the skills their Canadian partners have taught them to another village in their area.

This year the Mission and Services Committee is channelling the Overseas Relief contributions to the Bluefields Project in Nicaragua. This project, sponsored by London Conference, involves building a roof on a school in a Moravian Church-operated school project. In 1990, volunteers from London Conference built second storey walls on the school and now in 1996 funds are being raised to put up the roof. The first level is very overcrowded with children attending school in shifts in order to be accommodated. We invite you to participate in this worthwhile project if you can by using your Overseas Relief envelopes on Communion Sundays.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

From the M & S Committee

Through the Canadian Foodgrains Bank, (CFGB), United Church members sent two shipments to partners in Angola totalling 20,500 metric tonnes of corn, 1,981 mt of cooking oil, 12,000 mt of beans, and 200 mt of lentils for food-for-work development projects and to tide over rural families until harvest. Gifts to the CFGB are over and above our regular M & S givings. The M & S Fund supports our participation in the CFGB by paying our membership.

Who is an Elder at First-St. Andrew's? This question continues to crop up so I thought I would address it.

Under our former administrative system, The Official Board concept, a Church member was asked to become an Elder, and as such was a member of the Session. Once on the Session, you, as an Elder, were asked to join a committee of Session.

Under the Council system, introduced about three years ago, a Church member is asked to join a committee of Council. Once you have joined a committee of Council by election at the Annual Meeting, you automatically become an Elder of the Church, or just the reverse of the former system. I should also mention that during the year there are members who join a Committee as Volunteers. These people are not Elders.

Since our last report in Tidings, the Annual Meeting has come and gone, along with two Council Meetings. At the Annual Meeting you passed a balanced budget with the proviso that we fundraise to increase our M & S givings. At Council four chairpersons, Ron Logan, Karen Procunier, David Shaw and Murray Woods, agreed to guide a fundraising program. We trust that they will be fully supported by our congregation.

Again, at the Annual Meeting there was a motion, which was tabled, concerning the use of flags in the Sanctuary. The current procedure is to display the Canadian flag and the St. Andrew's flag when the anniversaries of Canada Day, Armistice Day and St. Andrew's Day are recognized. Council considered this matter and asked the Worship Committee for a recommendation. The Worship Committee reported to Council with the following motion: "That the Canadian flag be permanently displayed in the atrium, and moved to other places as appropriate, including being placed in the Sanctuary with the St. Andrew's flag on Canada Day, Armistice Day and St. Andrew's Day." Council gave unanimous approval to this motion. With the knowledge of the action of Council, the original motion made at the Annual Meeting has been withdrawn. The co-operative manner in which this subject has been addressed is very much appreciated.

A Strategic Planning Committee, SPC, has now been established. It will consist of a member of each of the appropriate committees of Council, including the Marketing Committee, and a Staff member. It will report to Council through the Stewardship Committee. Michael Walker will replace Jack Hillier as chair of the Marketing Committee and Jack will become chair of the SPC. The committee will work on a rolling three year horizon and bring recommendations to Council and the Congregation concerning our future direction.

The *Out of the Cold* initiative was introduced to Council by David Shaw, chair of the Social Action Committee, on advice from Catherine Moore. Bill Watson and Barb Plante "championed" this program and have done an exceptional job. I anticipate that they will advise Council at the June meeting as to how they see this program proceeding.

The June Council Meeting is on **Tuesday, June 11, at 7:30 p.m.** The Congregation is invited to attend this meeting, as observers, to see your Council in action. We try to be informal and you should feel free to arrive or leave as your schedule permits. Hope you can join us.

To say that the 1995 "Grow a Row" campaign was a success is an understatement! The congregations of First-St. Andrew's and St. Marys United Churches donated cash and product totalling more than \$13,200. Our 22 acres yielded 59 tonnes of corn. Additional support at a ratio of 4:1 by the Canadian



International Development Agency resulted in 295 tonnes of corn going into the Food Grains Bank system. The total impact of the growing project was in excess of \$75,500!

We are especially excited to tell you of the launch of this year's "Grow a Row" campaign. As a result of normal crop rotation we'll be growing soy beans instead of corn.

After meeting with the organizing committee in St. Marys, we've decided to hold two social events. Early in June there will be a "Rock Jamboree" followed by a hot dog roast, and later in the summer, near the end of August, there will be a sweet corn roast. Details will be forthcoming. 




