Need to book a wedding? Inquire about a meeting time? Arrange to have a notice printed in next Sunday's announcements? Usually the first person you will speak to when you call the church office is Pat Sole, and she will almost certainly be able to answer your question or fulfil your request.

Patience and flexibility are characteristics Pat practices as she goes about the varied tasks involved in her job. Besides the usual duties of typing bulletins and answering the telephone, she has to keep an eye on the door and be ready to buzz it open for visitors. And on occasion she is called on to do such things as lock up the dumpster, turn on the oven downstairs, and assist visitors who are touring the church.

Pat and her husband, Wes, grew up in Sarnia, having first met in grade two. It wasn't until they had both enrolled in a Special Commercial course after high school that they began dating. Pat's first job upon graduation was as secretary in the Guidance office at her high school. Wes joined the R. C. A. F. and after completing his training in electronics, they were married in 1958, and were transferred to Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. Three years later, they were posted overseas to France. They have two married daughters – Tracie, born in France, and Dawn, born in Germany.

By 1970, Wes had taken his discharge from the Air Force and entered the field of computers, working at U. W. O., Information Systems. Pat worked at Proudfoot House where she found that one half of the Board of Directors were from F. S. A. As a result Pat and Wes, attended a few services at this church, and enjoyed them so much that they joined the congregation themselves.

In the late 1980's Wes' work took them to Bermuda for a brief time, and in 1989 they returned to London, and Pat started working in the church office the following year. Pat says that one of the best things about her job is the people - the terrific staff team and all the members of the church. She and Wes usually attend both the 9:15 and Alternative Worship services and they took part in the drum-making workshop this fall.

Most recently Wes has become licensed by DDAI (the Davis Dyslexia Association, International), as a Davis Dyslexia Correction<sup>SM</sup> Facilitator. Currently he is the only Davis Dyslexia Correction<sup>SM</sup> Facilitator in Canada. A dyslexic himself, he is well aware of the many frustrations experienced by those with learning disabilities.

Pat and Wes. Pat helps with knitting for baby layettes and Bazaar, assists at OOTC and rang with the Mixed Pealers, and is a substitute ringer with the Laudamus Bells. Wes helps to keep the A/V equipment in working order as well as assisting with maintenance of the computer system. Pat and Wes both enjoy the fellowship and caring they experience at F. S. A.

#### Series: God's Stewards DOUG BOCKING

Behind Doug Bocking's quiet and unassuming demeanour lies a man of many accomplishments. Perhaps his greatest talent is a unique combination of vision and the ability to translate vision into reality through leadership, diplomacy, commitment and sheer hard work. A quick glance over a list of Doug's extensive volunteer and professional involvements over many years give many examples.

Raised in St. Thomas, Doug graduated from the University of Western Ontario in medicine in 1943. After a brief stint in the navy and further professional training, he set up a medical practice in London in 1953. He served as Dean of Medicine at UWO from 1965 to 1978, then as vice-president Health Sciences until his retirement from UWO in 1987.

In addition to his professional career, Doug has donated leadership and administrative skills to many community causes, largely in the areas of health, education, social services and the environment. His record of service includes stints on numerous boards, often in a founding or presidential capacity. Among these are Fanshawe College,

Westminster Institute, Boy Scouts, YM/YWCA, health-related agencies, Canoe Club and Upper Thames River Conservation Authority. Over the years Doug and his wife Vivian raised a family of six children. Vivian also has a long history of volunteer community service.

Doug has a long-standing love of the outdoors. Among his pastimes he lists birdwatching, nature study, hiking, canoeing and taking his border collie for outdoor romps. Locally, his favourite natural haunts are Komoka Park and Warbler Woods.

Back in 1942 Doug and a college friend canoed the Thames River from London to its mouth, then paddled across Lake St. Clair and down the Detroit River to Windsor. After their family grew up, Doug and Vivian enjoyed many lake trips by canoe. Later Doug moved on to the challenge of white-water canoeing expeditions through some of Canada's finest and most remote wilderness areas. While canoeing rivers such as the Nahanni, Churchill, Missinaibi and French, Doug became familiar with a number of Canadian Heritage Rivers.

Back in London, he envisioned the Thames River as part of that great system. In 1996, he initiated a process that brought together some 70 amateurs and professionals to assemble the background documentation to support the nomination of the Thames. The nomination was accepted in February of 1998. Now Doug continues to chair the co-ordinating committee while management strategies for the river are developed. The hope is that the Thames will be officially designated as a Canadian Heritage River in the year 2000. In the meantime, the Canadian Heritage Rivers board has presented Doug with an award of merit, in recognition of the outstanding quality of the submission prepared by Doug and his committee on behalf of the Thames. The London proposal is now

accepted as the Canadian standard for such matters.

In summing up the countless contributions of time and talent that he and Vivian have made to worthy causes over the years, Doug commented with characteristic humility, "We just felt we should be doing something to help the community."

First-St. Andrew's is proud to have Doug and Vivian as members and we thank them both for the many visions they have translated into realities.

Frank Meadows updated us on the new website being developed and asked for sponsorships of this project.

Terry Peters and Lesley Pergau presented the Needs Assessment Committee format. This committee meets every Wednesday night and will be asking for congregational input. 
was born in the hospital that was constructed in response to her grandfather's vision for such a facility.

She graduated from Victoria Hospital School of Nursing in 1966 and has worked in Emergency and Community nursing. 1966 must have been a vintage year, because she married a Dresden native, Allan Bedford, who was completing his accountancy program.

Allan's job opportunities took the family to Chatham and then to Woodstock. They returned to London in 1986 where he established his own bookkeeping business, and Heather was able to continue

her nursing career, most recently with ComCare Health Services. She assumed her responsibilities at First-St. Andrew's on Sept. 1, 1998. Heather and Allan have two grown children - Allan and Holly. #### WRAPPING UP THE DECADE

Is it all over? Has the final curtain dropped on the work of the Ecumenical Decade: Churches in Solidarity with Women, putting women's issues back behind past walls of silence and unconcern? Not if the energy and richness of the closing celebration in Guelph is an indicator. "Daring Hope" drew women from across Canada, some high-profile international guests, and a few men, into deep discussion about the roots of poverty, unemployment

and racism. About the challenges of raising children in an increasingly violent and heartless society. About women's role in reversing the terrible destruction of the Earth. About theology from a woman's perspective. And more.

Appropriately, some theological study was done in the context of quilt-making, guided by Bernice Santor, who many readers will know from her leadership while a member of FSA. We applaud her selection

as one of Canada's 50 delegates to the Decade's international finale in Harare, Zimbabwe, in November.

The open Festival Day concluding the celebration, with many outstanding women present - church leaders, artists, writers, ritual-makers, musicians, dramatists, drummers, story-tellers, and more ... plus a marketplace spilling over with beautiful and intriguing handcrafts, gave the 800 or so attendees just a taste



of women's contributions to our society and the world's life.

"The Decade", dreamed up by Senator and Very Rev. Lois Wilson and proclaimed by the World Council of Churches in 1988, took on reality at FSA in 1992, with a group formed on the initiative of Dorothy McPhedran and Emily Woods. Small in number, strong in spirit, the Decade Group produced a wonderfully moving feminist church service (recommended for use on Conference Sunday, 1993), two events on feminist methodology in bible study (the first led by Lois Wilson, the second by Bernice Santor), and one on feminine spirituality and the arts, before uniting with Anglican and Lutheran women in 1997 to form an inter-church committee. A video day at FSA, and this year's event, "Celebrating the Future", with speakers on women in politics, church, and society, concluded this group's active life. Some of its members will continue as a branch of the Women's Inter-Church Council, which is focussing currently on the "Year of Jubilee."

No, the work is not over. It will not be finished until there is no place in the world where women are subjugated, restricted, or given inferior status simply because they are women. More than that, it will not be over until the feminine spirit is given her full place in our lives; until emotional depth and expressiveness are recognized as intrinsic to all human nature; until we embrace Earth-life and our bodies as the hands-on work of a Creating God in whose face I, too, am reflected, as woman.

#### A SPIRE POINTING UPWARD



The words of the hymn "A Spire Pointing Upward", written by the Rev. Moir A. J. Waters, immediately come to mind when one reflects on the restoration work which was done on the exterior of First-St. Andrew's this past summer. This was the first step in the plan developed by the Property Committee to prepare FSA for the next millennium. Scaffolding was put up to the base of the steeple to provide the workmen safe access to the tower for painting and other requirements. The lighting in the tower, which had not been working for several years, was replaced. The steeple of First-St. Andrew's is now visible from as far away as south London!

All the woodwork around the windows was repainted after extensive scraping and burning. In most cases three to four layers of paint were removed, down to the bare wood, true witness to

those who went before us! New storm windows were installed on all windows, which were previously without, and all existing storm windows were removed before painting and repaired as necessary. The east and west entrances now are graced with new exterior doors. The brickwork of the building required extensive repair, especially on both side entrances and all chimneys.

We are indebted to E. Kellenberger and all subcontractors who worked on this project with so much heart and dedication. As you look at FSA, it is hoped that it

truly "lifts your heart and spirits high." The Property Committee hopes to keep FSA on a "sure foundation rising" so that it will truly stand the test of years to come. Exciting plans to enhance the interior of FSA are currently on the agenda for the summer of 1999.
