MEET THE NEW MINISTER

Call it serendipity. Call it being at the right place at the right time. Or just call it God's Grace.

But when Rev. Dr. David J. A. McKane received the opportunity to come to First-St. Andrew's United Church as the Minister of Worship and Administration, he was ready.

Rev. McKane was already familiar with First-St. Andrew's and he says the church was among a handful of churches in which he thought he would like to minister.


And, although the exhaustive search process took more than a year, it took only a short time for him to make up his mind to come to London. His family agreed.

A packed meeting of the congregation September 9th accepted, without one nay, the recommendation of the Joint Search Committee of First-St. Andrew's and Middlesex Presbytery, and in January, he will join Rev. Dr. Susan Shelstad on the ministerial team at First-St. Andrew's United Church.

His journey to London, Ontario, began in Northern Ireland. David McKane was born in the small village of Jordanstown, Northern Ireland before immigrating to Canada with his parents and two brothers and two sisters in 1958.

The family lived in Kleinberg, near Toronto, where David entertained thoughts of being an engineer. But, instead, he attended Laurentian University in Sudbury, where he received a degree in Philosophy.

He was married to Susan Newbery, a teacher, in 1968 and they have three daughters: Jeanne, Pamela and Erin.



David did his M. Div at Emmanuel College. He was ordained in 1970 and did post-graduate studies in Liturgics at Union Seminary at Queen's University in Belfast, Northern Ireland. He returned to Canada to complete his D. Min at Toronto School of Theology at the University of Toronto. His thesis was titled: *Integrating Life Experience and the Faith Story.*

He has served the church in Ireland, Nova Scotia and Ontario. He is currently Minister of Word, Sacrament and Pastoral Care at Royal York United Church in Toronto

Rev. Dr. McKane has served on a variety of United Church committees in Toronto Conference, General Council and Victoria University, Toronto. At General Council, he has chaired or been a member of the Hymn Worship Resource Committee, the General Council Worship Committee and was a Commissioner for 16 years. At Toronto Conference, he served as President, and chaired various committees including the Revenue Generating Group, Toronto Conference Executive and the Liturgy Committee.

Rev. Dr. McKane has also been secretary of the Canadian Liturgical Society, and taught Celtic Spirituality at Five-Oaks and Emmanuel College, among others.

The entire process of the McKanes' move to London has also been rather serendipitous. The McKanes began a search for a new home and found one in north London on the first try.

At the same time, before they even listed their Toronto home, their realtor told them she had shown their home to a couple and they immediately made an offer to buy. And so, the McKanes will move to London at the end of November.

At the congregational meeting, the search committee was asked the question: What attracted you to David McKane. Speaking for the group, committee member Doug Jones said it was his intellect, preaching skills, experience as a team leader and humour.

Presbytery representative Ed Tufts described the call as "a new beginning, and a whole new era for the community and the church."

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FINDING DAVID MCKANE

By the search committee

After the congregation elected us in April, 2000, the Joint Search Committee equipped itself to do the job by developing procedures based on the outline provided for United Church congregations.

To find David McKane, we held 29 meetings, considered 115 ministers (23 were referred, 34 applied and 55 were contacted). In making 129 visits to congregations, we required 36 Sundays and traveled 19,788 km. Three plane trips were needed.

Phone calls, letters, email, faxes, etc. numbered in the hundreds. Five congregational updates were circulated. Ten candidates were interviewed.

THE REV. DR. DAVID J. A. MCKANE:

The following words are those of David McKane as he describes his style.



“Since my ordination in 1970, I have consistently honed my skills as a poet, preacher and liturgist and have made myself available to the wider church through Presbytery, Conference and General Council Committees. I have a strong commitment to the congregation as a primary theological community in which faith is shaped, shared and tested in action. As a narrative theologian, I love to explore the connections between life experience and faith confession and have spent considerable

time reflecting on how people integrate their faith into their daily lives. Over the past twenty years, I have explored and recovered my Celtic Spirituality, a creation centred spirituality.

A people person by nature, I love to preach in a style that engages contemporary life experience with the biblical narrative.

Thirty years of Christian Ministry have led me down many a dark valley and up some daunting mountains, but they have enriched my life immensely, and, I hope, the lives of those with whom I minister.”

THE SINGING MINISTER

Music plays a large part in David McKane’s life. He was a member of the Hymn Worship resource Committee of General Council. For the past 25 years, he has teamed up with a former Laurentian University friend, Rev. Malcolm Sinclair in a duo: “The Singing Ministers”. It was a natural fit: both men had classical singing backgrounds.

And they both had the gift of gab and humour.

The pair, in Scottish garb, has sung on some 500 occasions in churches, hospitals, nursing homes and, of course, at Robbie Burns suppers. Over the years, the group has raised about \$250,000 for the Mission and Service Fund.

The McKanes were married in 1968. David’s wife, Susan Newbery is a “child of the manse” and grew up in the West Indies. She lived in Sudbury and Toronto, where she attended Teachers’ College. Since 1978, Susan has been working in the field of early childhood education. She is currently teaching for the Toronto Board of Education and in the Continuing Education area of Seneca College. Among her hobbies Susan includes sewing, learning to play the piano and slinging a paint brush and wallpaper spreader.

The McKanes have three daughters. Jeanne, an editor for a pharmaceutical magazine, is married to Rob Murakami, a warehouse manager.

BOOKS FOR TRINIDAD

If you stop and think back to your years in elementary school, no doubt a story about a gruelling research project, or favourite novel might come to mind. Living in Canada allows us the opportunity to access books through many different avenues, such as the public libraries, school libraries, and new and used book stores. However, there are places in our world where accessing books for research, information or simply enjoyment is rare. The island of Trinidad, located in the Caribbean, happens to be one of those places. However, thanks to the initiative, dedication and kindness of Dawne and Neville Mahabir, one school on the island was able to make books a part of the students' everyday school life.



In 1994, Dawne heard from her sister, Carolyn Ali, that the San Juan Presbyterian School in Trinidad was in need of a school library. At the same time, the London Board of

Education had amassed its discarded books at the warehouse. Neville and Dawne got permission to take some of the books. They packed their van with as many books as the van could hold. The books were then repacked into barrels and shipped to the school in Trinidad. This ritual has taken place every year since then.

At the Elementary School, a partitioned area was reserved for setting up the library. Students would peruse the books, share information and generally show a keen interest in their "new" books. Teachers took turns organizing, packing and carding the books. Presently, the school can loan books to students, as the number of books has increased. This is the only elementary school on the island that has this kind of facility.

For the first two years Neville and Dawne took the books to Toronto for shipping. Now, a local company ships the books. In 2000, the First-St. Andrew's United Church Women heard of Dawne's personal undertaking and offered to assist her, by covering the freight charges. Dawne and Neville accepted this generous offer and then proceeded to send another barrel to the Archibald Vocational Institute at their own cost. This year, 2001, the books will be divided between the Elementary School and the Vocational School which are both supported by the Presbyterian Church in Trinidad.

The continued support from members of First-St. Andrew's United Church is greatly appreciated by Dawne and Neville, as well as both of the Trinidadian schools. As long as there are books available for shipping, the Mahabirs will continue to send them where they are most needed.

FROM THE PARISH NURSE

I had never heard of parish nursing prior to my community placement at FSA. I have worked as an Intensive Care Nurse for the past twenty-five years. Although the work settings are quite different, there are many things that I have learned at FSA that I have been able to use in the ICU. I would like to share some of them with you.

The ICU is a fast-paced, very technical environment. Nurses prioritize care to meet the physical needs of patients. The spiritual needs are easily forgotten in this busy setting. Some of us shy away from the spiritual aspect of care because we feel it may invade a person's privacy. Often patients and families think, "the end is near" if you suggest a pastoral visit or a prayer. I now recognize the importance of meeting the spiritual needs of patients and families and caring for a person's mind, body and spirit.

I recently cared for a patient who asked me to retrieve some items from her suitcase. As I opened the case I found a bible and a prayer book. Ordinarily, I may have overlooked these items as I focused on her immediate physical needs. My FSA experience has made me more sensitive to the clues to my patient's spiritual needs. When I returned to the bedside we talked about her church and faith. Our patient/ nurse relationship reached a higher level.

Research demonstrates the positive relationship between health and spirituality. I have personally witnessed the sense of well-being and wholeness that comes with faith and a sense of one's own spirituality, thanks to my experience at FSA.

UCW GENERAL MEETING

Our May meeting was held at Westminster Hall on May 30. In keeping with our theme this year, of concern for Aboriginal Peoples, we gave \$5,000 to Bella Coola United Church, where Betty Sangster is the minister. This donation will be put toward the building of a new church used by the Aboriginal People of the reserve.

Our special guest was the Rev. Will Kunder, the director of the Francis Sandy Theological Centre for native ministry students at the Five Oaks Centre. He spoke about the residential schools for Native children which were started in 1849, and not finally closed until 1970. These schools were managed by four churches - Catholic, Anglican, Presbyterian and United - all under the direction of the Federal government.

Children were removed from their families and way of life in order to educate them, but many of these children endured physical, psychological, cultural and sexual abuse. Some did not return home for several years. Eventually it became evident that the assimilation was a failure, and often the abused children themselves became abusers, and turned to alcohol and drugs.

In 1986 an Apology to Native Congregations was delivered by General Council, and in 1994, the Council established a Healing Fund of \$1 million to support healing initiatives for First Nations. The apology has as yet not been accepted by Native People.

Will also expressed concern that many of the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Native Peoples have not been implemented.

Most of us were given a new insight into Aboriginal conditions, and what had been endured by thousands of the children who were forced to attend the Residential Schools.

Will Kunder is an inspiring speaker and we are all grateful to him for sharing his deep concern for our Native People.

LOOKING TO THE PAST

A great-great grandson of the man who started it all back in



1832 was a visitor to FSA on Canada Day. Al Howard and his children Sonya, 21, and Adrian, 16, are researching the history of their famous forefather and visiting areas where he ministered. The Rev. William Proudfoot was the first resident Presbyterian minister in London and built what was then known

as the United Associated Synod of Secession Church in 1833.

The interest began several years ago, when Al's daughter Sonya was in London and began research on William Proudfoot. The Howards decided to drive to London and find out more about William Proudfoot.

“I WAS HUNGRY AND YOU FED ME”

Five years ago Barbara Plante and Bill Watson traveled to Toronto to talk to the organizers of the “Out of the Cold” food program there. The logistics of organizing volunteers, determining food quantities, and providing overnight lodging all needed to be discussed. They came back with a proposal to the congregation, and it was heartily endorsed. Barb Plante and Bill Watson with the help of many volunteers were instrumental in beginning our “Out of the Cold” program.

Originally mattresses were purchased with money from the Hay Foundation. However, the number of people staying overnight did not justify the need for that part of the program, and so it was discontinued after the first winter. The Salvation Army and the Men’s Mission have beds for those who need them.

The downtown London churches are now providing suppers every night of the week. Most of the programs run over twelve months. A number of our volunteers come from other area churches such as St. Aidan’s Anglican Church, Riverside United Church, and from Exeter.

The number of dinners served ranges from as many as 155 to as few as 53. The menus vary each week, but the meals are always nourishing. Chile, macaroni and cheese, beans, meat casseroles, fresh cold celery and carrots or Caesar salad, bread, fruit, donuts, cookies, tea, coffee, juice and milk are some of the items served. Variations to the menu also occur in the summer. Our visitors are extremely grateful for the meals provided, and some stay to help put the chairs away after supper. Tim Horton’s donate the donuts and until recently Dempsters donated bread. From time to time other food donations are received.

Many volunteers make this program a success. It functions with a Coordinator of Food Purchases, four team leaders or co-leaders, and team members. Financial donations from the congregation help sustain the program. It costs anywhere from \$1.10 to \$1.50 per person to supply the meals.

At the end of August 2001 we had \$1,100 left in our account. The congregation is invited to contribute to “Out of the Cold” by submitting money to the church designated for this program. The M&S, Stewardship and Community Outreach Committee is the umbrella committee under which this program operates.

WHAT HAS COUNCIL BEEN DOING?

The first half of the May 8 meeting involved Council Members in a FOCUS GROUP, conducted by the Long-term Financial Planning Committee, established by the Feb. 11, 2001 Congregational Meeting.

Individual Council Members voiced their personal, committee, and general concerns about many facets of church life. Discussion was lively, objective, and wide-ranging.

Council also accepted the unanimous decision made at a well-attended joint meeting of three committees - Mission and Service, Stewardship, and Community Service - to amalgamate as one committee. Reasons given included the frequent duplication and overlap of services and projects, shortage of people power, and confusion as to who did what. The proposal will be submitted to the Congregation as required by the First-St. Andrew’s United Church Statement of Policies and Procedures. Council has agreed to rename the committee: Stewardship, Outreach and Mission.

At our June 12th meeting, Kerry Stover announced that he and George Jolink have obtained rights to the musical *Jesus Christ Superstar*, for presentation at FSA just prior to Easter.

At our September 11th meeting, council agreed to host a meeting of Middlesex Presbytery next June.

There are changes being made to the bookkeeping system at FSA to take full effect 2002. The planning has been done by John Scott and our office administrator Sue Scorgie.

INTRODUCTION

Do we have a financial problem at First-St. Andrew's? One year ago FSA members who attended a congregational meeting were worried enough, after hearing a budget report, that they established a committee to study the membership and financial situation.

This "Long Term Financial Committee" conducted nearly a dozen focus group sessions, and reviewed past visioning exercises.

The committee is now making a series of proposals to the congregation and council which, the committee believes, will make the church stronger in terms of membership, attendance, influence on people's lives and finances so that we will have a firm foundation in order to continue to do God's work.

The committee was authorized to find out why we were continually finding ourselves in a deficit position and to make recommendations to change the trend. This plan of action would involve strategies and procedures that would result in an increase in the number of active parishioners and increased financial contributions.

- Nikki Attwell (member of the music committee)
- Gertrude Bergey (council chair)
- Diane Macpherson (our former office coordinator)
- Ted Kostecki (community development coordinator).

We considered the major questions: how do we best serve our current members and potential members. Why is attendance declining and with it, finances?

We heard from the focus groups that our financial problem may also be a "mission" problem.

We heard the challenge that we have to get all groups working together as a team for the health of church, that we are a congregation of splinter groups each seeking to protect its turf.

We heard that we must find a way to expose to the community and to new potential members our greatest assets: our worship, our music, our sanctuary and our fellowship.

We heard that we must serve our congregation.

We heard that we must keep our church identity but operate the church in a more business-like manner.

Taking our research and the discussions in the focus groups, the committee formed a two-pronged plan that sought to alleviate our financial shortfall: one part deals with the financial side, the other with the "mission" side.

Although not everyone will agree with all proposals, it's our feeling they are the minimum necessary for the long-term health of FSA.

We feel changes must be made if our church is to remain strong and viable and able to serve its members and community.

We also feel the proposals give our congregation and ministerial team a strong platform on which to build into the future.

PART ONE: FINANCIAL

Many in our focus groups made it clear they didn't understand the status of our finances. There was a consensus that we must re-think our methods of running the church financially. Some participants were surprised by the size of the trustees fund and the division of bequeaths between operating and capital funds. There was surprise about the number and size of the "other" funds administered by various committees and the small return we are receiving on some funds. Our recommendations:

PROPOSAL: That FSA council make a greater effort to communicate the financial status (givings/expenses/trust funds) of the church to our membership through bulletin, Tidings, and committees.

PROPOSAL: That the Trustees assume their responsibility (as outlined in 5.1.4.5 of the trustees' responsibilities and authority) to allocate trust funds for major capital purposes, including insurance premiums, major repairs, maintenance or improvement. (In effect, the trustees would set the property committee budget.)

PROPOSAL: That council set a policy that directs trustees to:

- a) maintain a trustees' capital fund which would be capped at two-times the operating budget,
- b) Establish an Operating Reserve Fund for funds over the 2X operating level. These funds would be invested by trustees and managed and directed by council.

(Interest from the Capital Fund would cover the costs of the property committee, insurance, capital works, and maintenance with any remaining funds going to the operating budget.

Interest on the Operating Fund would go back into the operating fund, to M&S, or be re-invested in the Trustees Capital Fund, as Council decides.

The Trustees would approve and be responsible for the Property Committee budget.)

PROPOSAL: That the Board of Trustees manage all investments and trust funds held by the congregation, its committees, and organizations. Use of funds and proceeds remain the responsibility of the appropriate committee.

PROPOSAL: That committees present their budgets to council and the finance committee by June for approval by council in September. This is a responsibility of the Finance Committee – 5.5.4.2.1

PROPOSAL: That the Finance Committee strike an operating budget prior to the fall stewardship campaign and that budgets be based on the projected needs of the committee.

STEWARDSHIP:

There was strong opinion on both sides of the issue of how much money should be sent to the National church for the M&S Funds, when "God's work also had to be done here".

It was noted by the focus groups that UCW and other givings put the current total of M&S givings from FSA at 26%. It is hoped that, in future years, an operating surplus would allow more M&S funding. It was also noted that the original visioning report recommended we do more to help the hurting and disadvantaged in the London community and elsewhere in the world."

PROPOSAL: That council reconsider its commitment to the M & S fund as a percentage of envelope givings. That the total givings to M&S be established at 22% of our envelope givings, being made up of the UCW donation, the extra givings of our congregation and topped up from our operating budget.

PROPOSAL: That council name the chair for the fall Stewardship campaign in January.

PROPOSAL: That an ad hoc committee comprising members of the Finance and Property committees revisit the rate schedule for church property rentals.

PROPOSAL: That a more aggressive attempt be made to rent our hall and sanctuary.

FUNDRAISING:

Participants in the focus groups thought that a significant amount of money could be raised through various fund-raising activities.

PROPOSAL: That council set up an ad hoc committee to begin work on a Silent/Live auction to be held in February 2002.

PROPOSAL: That a volunteer be approached to help organize a "tour of heritage churches" in the spring of 2002.

PROPOSAL: That the Trustees be asked to sponsor and help organize a "mortgage burning" event for the access entrance.

PROPOSAL: That the "vision" committee be re-established (under 5.1.4.9.1 of the policy manual) and be marketed more heavily.

PROPOSAL: That the "Run the Church for a Day" campaign be revitalized.

MEMBERSHIP

The participants in various focus groups said we must decide what demographic group we should be seeking, what our image should be and how we should present it. A lot would depend on the new ministerial team.

PROPOSAL: That council set up an ad hoc committee, to prepare an action plan to "market" a new minister to the congregation.

PROPOSAL: That with the arrival of the new ministry team, council and staff hold a comprehensive retreat to establish priorities as to which demographic groups and interests we will market our church.

PROPOSAL: That the worship committee and narthex coordinator draw up a strategy for greeting the congregation before and after the Sunday worship service and for facilitating coffee and conversation.

PROPOSAL: That the worship committee

PART TWO: FULFILLING THE MISSION OF THE CHURCH

WORSHIP AND MUSIC:

Focus group participants felt there should be a better blend between worship and music in our services. There was a general feeling that the music is of the highest caliber, but there were concerns about whether it is also intimidating to people. There was a feeling our music should be less stuffy and formal, that the repertoire should be expanded, and that we should use more of our latent talent. Some people were concerned about the revenue lost in the concert series. Focus groups generally encouraged the worship committee to continue to look at the format and style of our worship services. Participants in the focus groups all agreed that people taking part in our worship service should feel more welcome.

PROPOSAL: That council combine the music and worship committees so that they will work in closer harmony to ensure that music and worship are more closely integrated in our worship service.

PROPOSAL: That council establish a concert sub-committee of the joint worship/music committee.

PROPOSAL: That the concert music policy be repositioned as a ministry: drawing people to the church, and having a positive revenue-producing function.

PROPOSAL: That there be a stronger marketing plan for concert programs to take advantage of staff and congregational resources.

PROPOSAL: That the music committee consider expanding the music program at FSA to include more opportunities for different age groups.

PROPOSAL: That the worship committee continue its work on the style and format of the worship service.

PROPOSAL: That the worship and music committees allow more young people to play a role in our service.

STAFFING:

Participants in the focus group sessions cautioned about cutting back on staff, since it would cut back on the work of the church.

YOUTH:

It was generally felt that we need to attract more youth to the church, and it may be necessary to determine how much work should be done on this. The idea of involving them more deeply in the service and other church work was endorsed. It was felt that music and drama were two strong attractions and that young people themselves should be asked what they want from the church.

PROPOSAL: That a youth council be formed to shadow council and its committees, as well as meeting independently. That our policies and procedures be amended so that the chair of this committee would sit on FSA council.

PROPOSAL: That the CD committee develop youth programs for the congregation and ensure they are carried out.

PROPOSAL: That the Christian Education committee consider establishing groups for men, for women not involved with the UCW, and bible study groups to study new writers and thinkers.

PROPOSAL: That council canvass our members to see if there are resources to put on courses as a revenue generator.

PROPOSAL: That committees be encouraged to use the volunteer lists more than they do.

COUNCIL

PROPOSAL: That it is premature to talk about merger with another congregation.

PROPOSAL: That council monitor committees to ensure they are meeting the objectives and responsibilities outlined in the Statement of Policy and Procedures.

A FINAL WORD

Fall 2001

“God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble” Psalm 46: 1 (NRSV)

How many times have you heard that scripture sentence? It is a verse meant to comfort and sustain us and is often used during Funeral and Memorial services.

Ever since the events of September 11, 2001 unfolded before our eyes, Psalm 46 has been used as one of the readings as we seek comfort and support with one another. Scripture and prayer have been vital in this difficult and troubling time. Take a moment and read Psalm 46 in its entirety. You will probably find meaning in it that you never realized was there.

Our world will never be the same. Since World War Two our world has not experienced a tragedy as enormous as Sept 11th. Church attendance was increased on Sunday, Sept 16th – people coming to the one unfailing source of strength. It was a very moving service – the words and music chosen carefully to help provide comfort. There were symbols of unity – the globe of the world on the chancel steps, and candles lit for the seven continents in our world. The choir surrounded us with the Introit – “Dona Nobis Pacem” – “Grant Us Peace” before they processed to the choir loft – a musical interlude that so aptly set the tone for the service. One of the Anthems was the Prayer of St. Francis:

Lord, make us instruments of your peace.
where there is hatred, let us sow love;
where there is injury, pardon;
where there is discord, union;
where there is doubt, faith;
where there is despair, hope;
where there is darkness, light;
where there is sadness, joy.
Grant that we may not so much seek
to be consoled as to console;
to be understood as to understand;
to be loved as to love.
For it is in giving that we receive;
it is in pardoning that we are pardoned;
and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

One more Bible verse to keep in mind: Romans 8: 38, 39 (NRSV):

“For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.”
