GETTING TO KNOW JEAN HILL

With a family background of service to others, it is not surprising that Jean Hill has carried on this tradition in her own life. In 1912, Jean was born to a Presbyterian Medical Missionary doctor and his wife in Kong Moon, a river port on one of the muddy tributaries of the Pearl River south of Canton China. In 1906, John McDonald, Jean's father, was commissioned to go to Kong Moon South China to search for a suitable area to develop a Mission Compound. Jean's mother Lillian, taught conversational English and Music at the girls' boarding school on the mission compound. Jean and her two siblings were taught by their mother at home. Because the three children played with the students from the boarding school, they all became fluent in Cantonese.

Jean and her siblings returned to Canada in 1924 to continue with their education. In 1933, she graduated from McGill with her B.A. in Education. Jean taught grade three at Stanstead College in the Eastern Townships of Quebec.

In 1939, Jean married Kenneth MacMillan, a United Church Minister who had just graduated from the Montreal Theological College. His first charges were two small congregations in the east end of Montreal Island. Jean was very involved with the activities of both churches. In 1942, their first child, Lillian, was born. That year took them to Parkdale United Church in Ottawa to replace a minister who was an Overseas Chaplain. While at this church Jean led Mission Circle Group, a professional women's group that was formed to study current missionary issues. Later, when Jean and Ken left this congregation, the group was named the Jean MacMillan Mission Circle.

Ken and Jean left for Fort William (now known as Thunder Bay) in 1945. This same year their second child, Keith, was born. They remained at this church for nine years where Jean was very involved with the Women's Missionary Society, Young Women's Society and CGIT.

In 1955, Ken and Jean returned to the province of Quebec to St. Lambert

United Church. They came to this congregation just as they were trying to build a Christian Education building. The congregation was very committed to having this built and paid for within 5 years. While there, Jean saw tremendous growth in the CGIT program she led, as well as many changes in the Christian Education Program. Unfortunately, Ken passed away in 1970. Jean remained in Montreal for another 6 years and continued with her commitments to St. Lambert United and also volunteered in the clothing centres at the Men's Mission and the Verdun Protestant Hospital.

Jean came to London in 1976 to be closer to her daughter Lillian and her family. Since that time, she has been a very active member of the First-St. Andrew's United Church family. She has been actively involved in UCW, Christian Education, Ventures in Mission, Bifocals and many other committees. Recently, she was honoured as an Elder Emeritus for her contributions to the life of the church. Interestingly enough, it was through the Ventures in Mission committee that she met her husband Gordon Hill, whom she married in the fall of 1984.

Helping others has always been Jean's primary interest. Along with her commitment to the church she has been very interested in the quality of life in our community. For eleven years she was involved with the Adult Basic Education Home Tutoring Program, teaching adults to read.

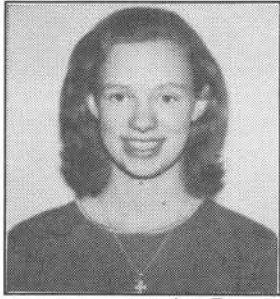
Family is extremely important to Jean. She has six grandchildren who are the joy of her life and she is soon to experience a new role, that of great grandmother. Two of her grandchildren have shared her passion for travel, and have gone with her to Scotland to explore family history.

Jean has had a very interesting and fulfilling life. She tells me she has truly enjoyed all that she has done and seen. She is a special woman whose grace and faith have seen her through all that life has to offer.

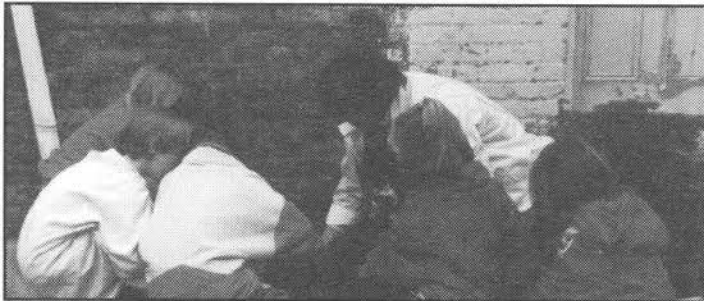

The theme of this retreat was 'Beginnings and Endings'. This was very appropriate as there are so many changes occurring in the Youth Group. A big group of seniors are saying goodbye, the middle group are just coming into their own as the core of the group, and the youngest faction are part of their own newly formed TNT (Teens in Transit), under the leadership of Chris Silcox.

A bitterly cold first night had us quickly snuggling into our sleeping bags to keep warm overnight. A highlight of Saturday's program was a visit from Susan Getchell, a talented and engaging storyteller. Her voice took us on a journey through the tales she told, teaching us more about ourselves along the way. The sharing and storytelling continued in the afternoon with a study of the Prodigal Son parable. We also found time for making crafts and composing prayers that we shared together in our warm and happy circle time in the evening.

The rain returned Sunday morning, but still didn't spoil the informal fun and fellowship of the congregational picnic and worship service, held inside the lodge. Several of the teens participated in the service, and helped to serve communion. This was a weekend of growth and self-discovery that we will not soon forget!

INTERVIEWS: TOWARDS THE 21st CENTURY

The church of the future -- what will it look like? Will we recognize it? Will it even exist beyond the end of this century? Such questions were addressed recently at both London Conference and at a Lutheran Church workshop held in the city.

The article which follows summarizes information obtained at those conferences by delegates Catherine Moore, Emily Woods, Frank Meadows, and Bill Watson.

The Reverend William (Bud) Phillips and Loren Mead, guest speakers at the respective conferences, both acknowledge that the church has changed radically in the past century. Church attendance is down and there are significantly fewer young adults involved in organized religion. Many people seek to fulfil their spiritual needs outside the church, while others claim religious affiliation but never attend church. Furthermore, an increasing percentage of the population comes from a non-Christian background.

In the light of these realities, how are we to respond if we hope to maintain the church in the 21st century? Mead's and Phillips' comments centred around four areas: environment, mission, character of the faith community, and the role of the clergy.

The time we once knew as Christendom no longer exists. There are many faiths around us, and electronic technology has speeded up communication and widened the circle of relationships available to us. Rather than feel threatened by these changes, we should adopt an optimistic attitude. Our mission to be God's people does not change, but how we carry out that mission does.

Mission, nowadays, applies not only to far off lands, but also to our own community. With governments cutting back on social services, the church is needed more than ever to help the less fortunate. Phillips believes that volunteers are key to the future of the church. According to him, people will be eager to volunteer if 1) the task is important to them, 2) they can make a difference, 3) they can share and expand their gifts and talents, 4) they can see an end to their task. People in a successful church know the mission of their church and can identify what is being done. They are engaged in worship, learning, and reaching out to others.

If our church is to remain vital, it needs to "grow younger" according to Bud Phillips. Children, young people, and new members all need to be included in the circle of activity and decisions. The result will be twofold -- a greater commitment by members

through involvement, and an infusion of fresh ideas.

There is also a need for ongoing Christian education throughout one's life. Many people within the church have a real desire to learn more about the Christian faith.

In the past, it was the role of the clergy to provide the ministry. Nowadays, however, Mead sees the minister as a facilitator. The trend is for the clergy to ask the laity how they can be helped to do the ministry.

How does First-St. Andrew's measure up to the standards set by Mead and Phillips? Catherine Moore commends our committees for their forward-thinking approach in attempting to meet congregational needs. The following are some specific examples of their work:

- Worship consults with Congregation and is not afraid to try new things in a sensitive manner;

- Christian Development offers an array of learning opportunities for all ages;

- the work of Social Action and Mission & Service stretches around the globe and also focuses on the needs of the London community. The *Out of the Cold* program is an example of such outreach;

- groups such as Membership and Nurture are working to build a greater sense of community within the congregation. We are exploring the possibility of sharing our church building with students of Weldon Park Academy this fall.

The church in North America may be facing difficult times, but there is no need for despair. This is merely another in a series of challenges the church has faced throughout the course of its history. There is a future for the church, although it may not be

as easily predictable as it once was. With a spirit of faith and optimism, however, we can meet the challenge.

Loren Mead is founder of the Alban Institute in Washington, an organization which studies congregational church life in North America.

COUNCIL REPORTS TO YOU

At the June 23rd Congregational Meeting, the negotiating team of Robin Procnier, Paul Huston and June McKay was authorized to pursue a contract with Weldon Park Academy. This is for the use of part of the Church facility for Junior and Senior Kindergarten for the 1996-97 academic year, and is to be presented to the Executive of Council for final approval. When you read this in late August or early September, you will probably know the result of the negotiation. I truly hope that the result is positive, not only because of your support, and that of the Staff, Council and Marketing Committee, but also because of the investment of time, talent and energy of those directly involved. We have sighted a paradigm shift in our Congregational life. I believe it looks good on us all and I am enthusiastic about our opportunities for future accomplishment.

What else is going on? From time to time, when space is available, you will see the names of the Chairpersons of Council printed on the last page of the Order of Service. Should you have any questions, concerns, or IDEAS, these are the key people with whom to talk it over. Please take advantage of this opportunity.

Mission and Service is one of our most important commitments. I hope you were able to hear and see Karen Procnier's approach on June 23. The Mission and Service Fund Raising Team will include a letter to us all in this mailing. Please give it your serious consideration.

Paul Merritt showed a copy of the new hymn book, *Voices United*, to the Council. It looks very good. The Worship and Music Committees will have a joint meeting in September to assess the book, and make a recommendation to Council.

Joint meetings are a good sign that "Participative Management" is working. A year ago last March, Dr. Meadows and I attended a conference led by Loren Mead. It became clear that in the Church of the Future, lay people will need to take more leadership than they have in the past. Committees working with other committees is a good sign that we are moving in the right direction.

There are some areas where we need some help. The Marketing Committee has recommended a Ride Program. That is, an initiative where we would provide consistent transportation to Church on Sunday mornings for people who would not otherwise get there. So far we have not had anyone come forward to champion this proposal. Do you know someone who could organize it? Could you?

I would like to mention one other area where we need help. Glenda Pennington, and others, are producing the musical *Godspell* at the Church in November. They are looking for two corporate sponsors who would sponsor to the extent of \$500 each. The sponsor's advertisement would be distributed on posters and published in the program. Would you help us here?

As I write this, the summer is about to begin. As you read this, summer will be all but over. I hope that we will all have enjoyed it!

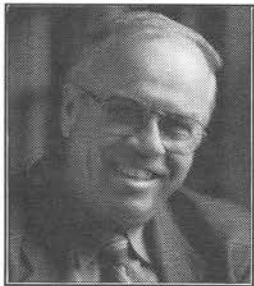

Ardath Finnbogason-Hill, a nurse-educator with considerable experience in personal counselling, and Jo Ann Silcox, a psychiatrist, work as a team to provide initial assessment and follow-through counselling for individuals, couples, families or groups facing personal transitional crises.

Under the direction of the Ministerial Staff who provide individual spiritual direction to those seeking help where requested, the Counselling Service is staffed voluntarily by three members of the congregation whose professional training and daily work experience is in the counselling context.

There are several programmes geared to different age levels: Rainbows is a peer support programme for pre-school through grade eight; Spectrum is a support programme specifically developed for young adults in high school; Prism is a programme for single parents and stepparents that can help adults get in touch with their own feelings about what has taken place in their family and help rebuild the family unit. First-St. Andrew's works in co-operation with Rainbow groups at Robinson Memorial and Colborne St. United Churches, to give more people of all age groups access to this healing process.

Today, many school age children live in single-parent family homes. In addition, many children live in stepfamilies and have serious difficulties adjusting to their new family situations.

When a change takes place in the family - whether it is death, divorce, separation, or abandonment - it has a profound effect on the whole family. Children as well as adults grieve over the loss of a loved one who was once a part of their everyday lives.

When people in schools and churches speak of the "Rainbows" programme, they are likely referring to the support programmes for children and adults who have experienced death, divorce, separation, or abandonment.

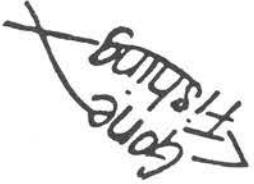

Inside Things and the Program Guide is much information about ample opportunities to participate with this people of God in discerning God's will and moving forward with confidence into an uncertain future. Remember, the Church is about really important invisible things like celebrating the love and forgiveness of a God who is always with us and who strengthens, comforts and challenges us. Those things can give us hope. And that will be a great and powerful gift to the world!

A question keeps recurring like a response in a litany -- "What is the future of the church?" We are indeed in a time of transition. The future we are moving into will be very different from either the past or the present. But it is still out of focus. We cannot yet see clearly or, therefore, plan carefully. Do we throw up our hands in despair? We think not.

The Scriptures are full of occasions when God called people to new challenges and sometimes "I will help you", ... "We are God's people too. As we move into an uncertain future, we can claim those same promises of God for ourselves. God's presence and God's help are ours too.

If those seem like things that you have a tough time getting hold of, then we invite you to participate in some of the work of preparation - like sharpening our vision to see God's presence and activity in the past and the present, or developing our abilities to prayerfully listen for and hear the truth and purpose of God, or investing time and energy in the church community so that together we may be attentive to God's will and responsive in service.
