Part One (of four): Its People

Herb Wonfor wondered as he wandered on his pastoral calls. One after another of the callees, in discussing favourite church activities, had responded with unmistakable lively enthusiasm, "Well, the Marian Keith Club" - (a writer of many local Ontario moods of the L.M. Montgomery period - in considerable demand.) The name rang a bell with Herb from his early job in his father's Montreal book store. But what was her name doing here? And in the Club?

Yes Herb, same person, same creative person. Here the recognized author, Marian Keith was Esther, the wife, help-meet of our minister Dr. D. C. MacGregor. See the stained glass window in his memory, as well as the official portrait.

Very early in their congregational life (October 31, 1914), she began a group for girls, numbering 12 - 14 in all. No CGIT then when it arrived, she shifted the Marian Keith title into serving a slightly older group, 17 years and up. Marriage usually marked graduation. Membership was truly ecumenical - much ahead of the conventional, with a comfortable, active fellowship from a variety of other churches - Anglican, Metropolitan, South London. The Club flourished up to a membership of about 50 by 1935 - perhaps 65 on its 21st birthday. Roll rosters are unfortunately non-existent now - only fragmentary. It filled the smaller lower hall at its weekly, Monday supper meetings and had to be subdivided into small sections for close personal functioning, as well as relaxing open sessions of the whole. Those group leaders were Mrs. Morley Adams, Mrs. J. D. Buchanan, Mrs. Angus Graham, Mrs. Emerson Nicholls, Mrs. J. D. Cameron and Mrs. J. R. Armstrong, as well as latterly Miss Madeline Roddick. All the executives were girls from the membership. Mrs. MacGregor was honourary president and chief counsellor privately permeating the whole. We were all her "my dears". Her phrase "best beloveds" was reserved for formal thank-you notes, or other key letters.

You can still find some of us or our relatives in the pews. How many of these names do you know? I tried to get all the local names but if I missed you, please let Mr. Wonfor or the Church office or me (438-6900) know. I'd like to complete the list. An asterisk indicates still meeting together, for a fortnightly lunch and discussion.

After at least 70 years, many treasured names are those of friends beyond: like Alice Darch Cole, Alice Servent, Madeline Roddick, Marmy (Marjorie) Edy, Marjorie McKee, Catherine Porte, Edna Durrant, Mary Anderson, Lillian Husser (Barbara Dalrymple's relative), Jean Fraser Campbell. Keep reading. There's an unexpected ending.

Marian Keith Members: Gladys Holden Abbott (now at Metropolitan), Jean Gorwill, Dorothy Silverwood Lawrence, Irene Snider*, Margaret Walker Waters, Audrey Webster, Helen Stone*, now at Calvary, Evelyn Uren (sister of Lillian Madill), Kay MacDonald, Doris Halet Nobes de Burgh*, now at Metropolitan, Emilie Tancock Elliott* at Bishop Cronyn, Evelyn Downing* comes to our UCW, Frances Kent* now at Elmwood Presbyterian, Anne Porte*, Helen Rowat, her sister Jean Gorrell, Frances Jacobs Girling, Mary Anderson Haslam*, Ella Martin Johnston, Marie Hodgins McLachlan, Louise Wyatt*. There may well be some more, like Isabel Letts, survivors in Toronto.

Read on for the pleasant bonus surprise. There is a note from somewhere after 1925 and before 1937, a report of young women of the Marian Keith Club putting on the play "Little Women" at South Collegiate under the auspices of the Nightingale Club of Wesley United. Also in the cast were Bob Cram, Aubrey Clendenning and Leonard Hayman. Who were those guys? And guess what - the director was Rudolf Eberhard. In the Marian Keith Club news records, of all places!



TAKE A WALK WITH THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

Almost as soon as you enter the doors of First-St. Andrew's on a Sunday morning, you will experience the warmth of this congregation. A friendly face peers down at you from the top of the stairs and asks if you will need any help.

One of the folks who greets you is a new member who was encouraged to become involved by serving on reception. As you go to hang up your coat, your eyes are drawn to the tables in the narthex. Those pamphlets about the past and present First-St. Andrew's look very interesting. You select the yellow one with the familiar photo and proceed to the sanctuary doors.

You now enter the sanctuary. Another friendly person escorts you to your seat. Once you settle in your seat you notice a grey visitor's card in the pew holders. This card was primarily designed for visitors who might be interested in joining the church but there is also a space on the card to leave a message for the ministers. You jot a note about a fellow member who has suddenly become rather ill and remind yourself to put it on the offering plate.

The order of service indicates that new members will be joining this morning. Prior to the service they have been enjoying coffee and a light breakfast in the parlour, have had their photos taken, and have been presented with a lovely corsage. They have also been introduced to at least one other member of the congregation in what we call our buddy system. During the service these new members will be called to the chancel to be formally received as members. Some may join by profession of faith and others by certificate of transfer from another congregation. On this particular Sunday a number of teens and adults will be confirmed.

After the service you descend to the lower hall for a cup of coffee. You say hello to one of those new members who is sporting her corsage. During your conversation your discover that on the previous Thursday she attended an evening of orientation hosted by the Membership Committee. You introduce the new member to a long-time member of the congregation. Soon they are engaged in a lively conversation. Someone with a pink mug can't help but listen in. You invite him to join the conversation. "I'm glad you chose to visit us this morning." you say. You linger over coffee as your partner was serving coffee this morning and you must wait while the dishes are being washed. Next week it will be your turn!

Finally all the cups are clean and you head out to the parking lot. On your way you pass by the church office. Your partner wonders how we managed before computers. It must be quite a job for the office staff and the Membership Committee to maintain a roll of our many members and keep an accurate mailing list. How do they ever find time to archive our historical documents?

As you get into your car you wave good-bye to your new friends. "See you next Sunday!"

ACCESS UPDATE

Access is now tracked for completion of construction during the summer of 1994.

At the congregational meeting, held on Sunday November 14th, a strong majority of the attendees voted to proceed with the project at an estimated cost of \$850,000.00. Following the receipt of revised tenders, final approval to proceed will be sought at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, February 13, 1994 following lunch.

The completion of the project within the \$850,000.00 budget has required some changes to the plans which were used to obtain bids during June 1993. These changes have now been defined and the revised program will be presented to the Church Council for its approval on January 19, 1994. The recommended changes, for the most part, involve the use of lower cost materials and will not compromise the essential features of the project. One portion of the project, landscaping, has been deleted from the contract and a crew of volunteers will be used to complete this work.

To date, \$650,000 has been committed to support Access, which is well in excess of the initial goals. Given the approval to proceed, the fund raising committee has taken on the challenge of helping the congregation achieve this new goal. We are optimistic that with the support of the congregation we will ACHIEVE this new target. The proposed fund raising plan is based on:

- applying for a government grant of up to \$40,000 for organizations to improve accessibility.
- asking those who have pledged or donated to Access to consider extending the 5 year commitment by one additional year. (We believe this will raise another \$40,000)
- continuing to provide opportunities for those who have not participated to date to become involved. We hope this will raise another \$30,000.
- raising the balance through a First-St. Andrew's bond issue that would be designed to finance the remaining amount.

The implementation and completion of the project will include the following items:

- a) Obtain revised bids from contractors.
- b) Obtain approval of the Congregation at the Annual Meeting on February 13th for:
 - 1) Appointment of a contractor for the construction.
 - 2) A project budget based on a firm price from the recommended contractor.
- c) Construction to commence Easter Monday, April 4/94
- d) Substantial completion of construction by early September.

During the construction period the Sanctuary and Chapel will be available for use. However access between the Church and Sunday School portion of the building, including the parlor, will likely be obstructed during a major portion of the construction period. A more precise definition of the effects from the construction will be available after a contractor has been appointed and a work schedule developed.

With your continued encouragement and financial support we can celebrate the successful completion of our renewed facility in the fall of 1994.

MEET THE DODINGTONS

Anyone who makes use of the First-St. Andrew's car park will undoubtedly have seen two cars, one bearing the licence plate "TUNERS" and the other "VOICER". Sometimes, when there is work to be done inside the church, there may be a van labelled "DODINGTON & DODINGTON". These vehicles belong to Ross and Linda Dodington who are responsible for keeping our fine organ in good condition at all times.

After working as a pipe organ tuner in Toronto for Casavant Frères Ltée. for several years, Ross, along with his wife Linda and their two children Barb and Jim, started their own firm of DODINGTON & DODINGTON PIPE ORGAN SERVICES INC. in 1971. At that time, they worked out of Elora for the Toronto and London offices of Casavant. In 1982, the Dodingtons were appointed official representatives for Casavant in Western Ontario. Their firm now employs ten people including the four family members. They provide a wide range of pipe organ services including new instruments, rebuilding, restoration of historic instruments, organ transplants and general maintenance. A visit to their workshop - a converted barn on their property in Richmond, east of Aylmer - is a fascinating experience for anyone interested in seeing the amount of work necessary in organ building.

Having settled in a lovely old farmhouse in Richmond, Linda and Ross were now within commuting distance of London, both for choir rehearsals and for church services. First-St. Andrew's Choir members were delighted in 1982 when they chose to join our choir and our church. Linda became a valued member of the alto section and Ross became the bass soloist.

Both Linda and Ross were brought up in musical families in Toronto. They met one another in high school during rehearsals for H.M.S. Pinafore. Later, Ross became the bass soloist at Fairlawn United Church. Then, after graduating from the Royal Conservatory of Music with an A.R.C.T., he became the bass soloist at St. George's United Church in Toronto. This was Linda's family church and the church where they were married. For eighteen years, Ross was a member of The Festival Singers of Canada, a choral group which won great acclaim.

For diversion, throughout their busy careers, Ross and Linda have collected and restored several antique cars and boats. When the weather is fine, watch for them as they drive to church in a 1934 Dodge, in immaculate condition, their pride and joy since early high school days.


TOC ALPLHA '93, A REFLECTION

Lent, Holy Week, and Easter 1994

Dear Friends,

The season of Lent begins at First-St. Andrew's with an invitation to all to join the Teens for the Annual Shrove Tuesday Pancakes Supper, 6:00 p.m., Feb. 15th. Not only are the pancakes delicious, but this is an excellent way to mark the first step of our spiritual journey toward the most significant time of the Christian year, Easter.

If you have never experienced the Ash Wednesday service in the Chancel, consider doing so this year. It sa time of gentle, spiritual intensity and focus, marking the beginning of Lent. Ashes are traditional symbols of repentance from sin, or of grief and mourning. Ashes from the cross on the forehead of believers. On Ash Wednesday we remember how Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem led him directly to his death.

Lent is a time for societal and self examination in preparation for renewal of our commitment to God's way. Fasting and other ways of showing penitence are characteristic of this season. For example, Christians often forego some of their usual activities to devote more time to Scripture readings, prayer and meditation.

Holy Week begins with Passion/Palm Sunday in which we re-enact the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. On this day long ago, palm branches were cut from the trees, laid on the road, and waved in the air as Jesus rode into Jerusalem. The whole narrative of Holy Week from Palm Sunday to the crucifixion is read from scripture on this occasion.

Christians do well to remember that there can't truly be an Easter without a crucifixion. Take time to reflect during the Gethsemane Vigil in the Chapel, starting 8:00 p.m. up to the Good Friday Service which will be observed this year at Metropolitan United Church.

Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. The church returns to joyful purple to pure white and gold. Life, hope and eternity are keywords in the celebration. Jesus Christ is risen indeed!

Once again, our Twenty Something group will offer an outdoor Sunrise Service on Easter morning. Dress warmly, come early and enjoy this time with family and friends. Indoors, our regular services with proclaim the resurrection with lilies, trumpets and the music of the heavens. Come and celebrate with us!
