"Kilb and Kilb" is one of the cheery greetings you might receive when you telephone the home of Lorna and Albert Kilb. Although Albert jokes about his creative answering style, this particular greeting seems to be an appropriate reflection of the partnership which exists between these two people.

The partnership began many years ago in Toronto where they met as teenagers at

Runnymede United Church. Both were leaders of Bible study

groups, and members of the choir and youth groups. Their mutual interest in horse back riding, dancing and tennis (which they played on the church tennis courts) resulted in many hours spent together, and eventually, marriage in 1939.

Londoners since 1956, the Kilbs have raised two sons and a daughter, and now have eight grandchildren. Throughout their lives they have been involved in a wide variety of activities. Lorna has been legal secretary to a Chief Justice, a member and

chairperson of the Alma College Board of Management, and an elder and presbytery member in the United Church. In 1985, as an officer in UCW Conference, she and nine other women from across Canada were chosen to go to Korea on a month-long exchange to offer encouragement to the women of Korea in their church work. This fall Lorna will complete a two-year term as president of the UCW here at FSA.

Albert also has had opportunities to combine travel and work. As a secondary school teacher and technical director, he was sent to Ghana to train teachers in 1961-62. Back only ten months from that assignment, he was dispatched to Singapore as principal of a school similar to our community colleges. During this stay in Singapore,

Lorna also did some teaching and was the leader of a Girl Guide company which contained representatives of eight nationalities.

While postings in Ghana and Singapore permitted the Kilbs to do a great deal of travelling -- on one occasion they spent seven weeks camping in Europe -- they also gave them an appetite for more travel. As a result, they spent a year abroad, travelling as far as Turkey in the east, and Morocco in the south.

Both avid photographers, the Kilbs are much in demand for their slide shows which offer a glimpse of the countries they have visited. Lorna is the script writer and Albert, the slide arranger. Recently, at a UCW meeting, they presented a show entitled "Giving Thanks in Many Tongues," and they are now working on their Christmas

presentation to the Kiwanis Club -- "The Silk Route with Lorna, Albert and Marco Polo."

Retirement years for the Kilbs are varied and fulfilling. Besides keeping in touch with their family, they remain active in community and church work. Albert continues his involvement with the Kiwanis Club as a distinguished Lieutenant Governor, sings in a barbershop chorus, and sells cheese at the FSA Holly Bazaar. Lorna enjoys china

Teens in Transit, known as "TNT", is a new group started last spring. Led by Chris Silcox, this dedicated group of Grade 6, 7 and 8's, aged 11 to 13, meet to talk about current issues and to get to know others their age in the church community. They meet each week during regular church, upstairs in a small side room off the main teen group room.

The meeting place is a cozy spot

complete with cushions to sit on, and happy face banners adorning the wall. Plans are in the works to paint the room to

make it feel even more their own. The members enjoy participating in a trivia game Chris has set up, and come prepared to answer questions about current events, sports, music and the like, gaining an increased awareness of the world around them in the process. TNT fills a gap that previously existed between Sunday School (Kindergarten to Gr. 6), and teen group (Gr. 8 to end of high school). It is a fairly focused age, and Chris expects the group to have a fairly high turnover rate, as the preteens move into the youth group. TNT provides encouragement to "keep them coming to church, develop friendships, and keep involved in church activities throughout their lives," says Chris. These 11 to 13 year olds might be tentative about joining a "big kids" group. They are still working on finding their own identity. TNT and the youth group have an interactive relationship. TNT members are invited to youth group events such as the winter and spring retreats, the Hallowe'en party, and other activities. As the very first members of TNT mature and it is time for them to move on, they will surely be strong, confident members of the main youth group.

## HOW DID GROW A ROW '96 DO?

Night had fallen, the wind was howling and the snow was swirling. The road underneath was a gliding pad and the car was headed for the ditch. I slowly applied the brake; we managed to stay on the road, and Bill could hear his heart again.

This was March 1996. Bill Knowles and I were headed to an organizational meeting for the Food Grains campaign with the folks from St. Marys United, St. Marys, Ontario. We didn't make that meeting, but were able to ATTEND several subsequent meetings at Jack Richardson's farm on Highway 7, just south of St. Marys.

In May, the Social Action Committee came to church in Western gear. Eventually \$2,500 was collected from the congregation at First-St. Andrew's. About this time the soybean seeds were planted on 22 acres at Jack Richardson's farm. In June, Bill and I joined the committee from St. Marys United as we collected several hundred pounds of rocks from the field. The plants were 3 or 4 inches tall and bounced back after we stepped on them. By removing the rocks we protected the combine blades from possible damage during the fall harvest.

On September 15 the congregation at St. Marys United invited everyone at First-St. Andrew's to a pot luck lunch following their morning service. Several of us attended their service and stayed afterwards for the pot luck.

On October 12 the big day came. The \$250,000 harvester was in

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place and the land was finally dry. Members of both committees were present as the big machine started its work. Eight hours and a few breakdowns later, 25 tons of soybeans (42 bushels per acre) had been harvested and were trucked to the Perth Co-operative elevators near Rannoch.

A total of \$9,400 has been raised (\$6,900 from St. Marys United and \$2,500 from First-St. Andrew's) for this project. The total costs and the profit derived from the soybeans have not yet been tallied. However, with the 4:1 matching program from the Canadian Development Agency (CIDA), this year's project is sure to raise a great deal for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank.

## A LOOK AT THE SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

The Social Action Committee is active in many behind-the-scenes activities at First-St. Andrew's, as well as some that are more visible. It is made up of a group of very dedicated people who do social action work at First-St. Andrew's and in the larger community.

The food that is regularly collected at Sunday morning worship services is taken to St. Paul's Daily Bread Food Cupboard on a weekly basis. Our church looks after their baby needs by providing baby food, formula and diapers. Cash donations are gratefully accepted as well as donations of food. Bill and Jean Knowles are our link to Daily Bread and take the food over at the beginning of the week as well as assist with the distribution of the food at Daily Bread.

Tom Magee operates a furniture cupboard which has been in existence for approximately ten years. He collects furniture which people no longer need and distributes it to needy families and individuals. Tom is in contact with 18 different organizations in the city which make use of our furniture cupboard. He can often use assistance in moving the furniture and welcomes offers of time and energy. Tom has recently had help from Gary Moore.

Barb Plante and Linda Badke represent First-St. Andrew's on the board of ELUCOC, the East London United Church Outreach Cluster. ELUCOC supports two half time chaplains, Carol Langford and the Rev. Susan Eagle. Carol Langford works in the Cascade community in southeast London and Susan Eagle's area is the northeast, primarily the Oakville area (formerly Cheyenne). The workers do everything imaginable to help their constituents build community under very trying circumstances.

The Social Action Committee has sponsored Christmas parties in the two ELUCOC communities in the past three years. As board members we hope to raise the profile of ELUCOC at First-St. Andrew's so that as many members of the congregation as possible can feel a connection with the work of ELUCOC. To that end we hope to have an annual ELUCOC service as was done last October when Susan Eagle preached. The fund raising committee of ELUCOC works hard to raise the needed funds. Our big fundraiser for 1997 will be the third play of Rod Beattie's farm trilogy. It will be performed at Banting Secondary School on **Friday February 21** and would make a good Christmas present.

Tom Magee and Pamela Commodore are First-St. Andrew's representatives on LIFT, the London Innercity Faith Team. LIFT is composed of twelve downtown churches and works collaboratively on issues and concerns affecting the downtown community. The LIFT Board has started two homes for ex-psychiatric patients.

The Canada Foodgrains Project in which we are twinned with St. Marys United Church in growing soybeans for developing countries is another Social Action project. It was described in the previous issue of Tidings. We have a subgroup of Bill Knowles and David Knoppert who met with the St. Marys committee to plan the Foodgrains project.

The Social Action Committee, in partnership with five other churches, are sponsoring the Jozic family, a refugee family from the former Yugoslavia. The sponsorship is being done through Siloam United Church. Church members are encouraged to offer financial support to this venture. On September 29 the Social Action Committee hosted the second annual barbeque on the church grounds following the eleven o'clock service. The proceeds went to assist in sponsoring the Jozics.

Keep your eyes peeled on the Sunday bulletin and future editions of Tidings for new Social Action ventures. New members and volunteers are always welcome on the committee.

## COUNCIL REPORTS TO YOU

Hello again! What is Council doing

Since the inception of the Council System, you, the Congregation, have been invited to attend one Council Meeting each year. At the October meeting, it was agreed that ALL Council Meetings will be open to the

Congregation. You may attend all or part of the meetings as observers. We hope this flexibility will allow you to come and see how your Council functions.

The first of the projects recommended by the Strategic Planning Marketing Committee has been implemented. Co-ordinated by Dr. Meadows, brochures describing each of the downtown (L.I.F.T.) churches have been placed in the downtown hotels in the city, and in the Visitor Information centres. It includes a sketch of each church, and a map showing the church locations from Oxford St. south to King, and from Talbot St. east to William. Now in the works is a brochure specific to First-St. Andrew's.

We have found that finding people to implement the important programs identified by the Strategic Planning Committee is tough. To address this, the Marketing Committee has assumed responsibility. I would like to highlight the Ride to Church proposal, for I believe it has tremendous potential. It would complement the "Access," and reach out to current members, and hopefully, new members, who need help to get to our worship services. Once again I ask, Can You Help?

It is generally agreed that we need a long term plan for Farquhar House. The building needs help, particularly on the inside, requiring a major expenditure. A realistic cost/benefit study is required, and I am pleased to report that your Board of Trustees has set up a subcommittee to develop such a study. Once completed and approved by the Trustees and Council, it will be taken to you, the congregation, for final approval.

Each time I have introduced the new Council at the time of Induction, I have said that they represent more than 140 committee members. The real number is 159, filling 169 positions. Nine people are on two committees and one person is on three. This outstanding volunteer support is truly appreciated by each Council member. On their behalf I thank each of you, for it is your participation at committee meetings that influences decisions taken at Council.

Now we are entering the Advent season. It is a wonderful time of worship and music. May God bless each one of us, and help us to participate.

The committee received approval from the Council to be called THE VISION FUND COMMITTEE, as well as to use the following Vision Statement:

The life of a congregation centres around its ministry. All of what we are about has been built on our history, exists in the present, and extends into the future. Ensuring the financial component of all our programs is always a demanding challenge. Our Vision Fund is one way of combining present and future funding to ensure that our life and work will

Through the cooperation of the committee and the expertise of its members, many exiting ideas will emanate in the future.

The purpose of the day was to get to know each other better, and also to study the new United Church Hymnal, Voices United. Betty Sangster and Don Jones were facilitators for the day, and we thoroughly enjoyed discovering the vast resources in the book.

The new book, published by the United Church of Canada, is fully indexed, and contains many new hymns, as well as some of the "old favourites" from the former black Hymnary which had been omitted from the latest red Hymn Book. There are a number of other resources, devotional helps, prayers, and a list of scripture passages which have been crossreferenced with the hymns to make hymn selection

easier for those designing a worship service.



We learned some new hymns, and had time to choose some of our favourites as well. Paul Merritt assisted at the electric keyboard and Jack McKay with the closing Communion Service.

The outcome of the day was to make a recommendation to the Church Council that First-St. Andrew's purchase 650 copies of the book for our use. This was a unanimous and enthusiastic decision. This was done on Oct. 8, and the books arrived a few days later. A Dedication Service will be planned for the fall, and we feel certain that our congregation will benefit greatly and that the worship services will have a new thrust. An opportunity will be given for those who wish to make a donation to the hymn book fund, and/or to donate books as memorial gifts.

## IN CASE YOU WONDERED



On Sunday morning when you step through the new south-east entrance, under and into the bright glory of the blues, greens, and maize-yellows from the gleaming shapely glass above, with its dove ascending, you walk through the gift of a devoted life-time and firm memories of the giver, a loyal leader in this congregation, to whom he left his entire estate.

Ken (Kenneth) Yorke, born in Glencoe, was the son of Charlie Yorke (for many years principal of the High School there), and his wife, Jessie MacIntyre Yorke, a church leader both here and in Toronto in the days of Mrs. John Y. MacKinnon, with whom she often worked.

Ken was a pharmacist of such when he completed his service overseas with #10 General Hospital, it was suggested

that he should train as a doctor. "I'm too old," he said, but really he had brought his pharmaceutical training practice to a high degree of medical expertise already. and trained many neophytes to his own exacting standards.



He enjoyed congenial, friendly company, travel, and new horizons when occasion served. He relished social skills and their traditions, like the concept of "gentleman". He was aware of the niceties of language. He enjoyed the many varieties of the beauty of art of high quality: music (so it was appropriate that Barrie Cabena composed a commissioned work in his honour - variations on a 17th

century psalter tune, hymn #130, its name is *York*); paintings; furniture fabrics; antiquities; ceramics; choice pieces of silver, jade or ivory could charm his demanding eye, and he was generous in his gifts.

No self aggrandizer, he knew himself well and he admired excellence. He knew the helpful satisfactions of getting things done gracefully and well.

He would have appreciated the light of the stained glass, bought in his commemoration. So, enjoy its glorious light, which, as St. John's gospel says, "darkness has never mastered."

## THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Patti Crosby-Moldowan claims not to be an artist, but her sculpture, "The Good Shepherd" (named by Emily Woods), displayed on a pedestal in a naturally-lit corner of the atrium, attests to her skill as a sculptor.

After a process which includes soaking a piece of fabric the size of a single bedsheet in wallpaper paste, wringing out excess moisture, inserting a styrofoam ball in the centre of the cloth and tying it to form the head, and moulding the wet fabric around a tomato cage turned upside down to form arms and body, the piece is left to dry for three or four days. Then, the wet head drapes are added and let dry another three days. Finally, a coat of specially mixed spray paint is applied and left to dry.

We thank Patti for her gift, lovingly formed, and evocative of images of caring and warmth, nurture and guardianship; and welcome her, her husband, Bob, and two young daughters, Breanne and Kaela into the First-St. Andrew's family.

The Archives Committee of First-St. Andrew's wishes to thank the many people who have donated memorabilia and artifacts for the preservation of our rich and interesting history. We continue to welcome and encourage our members to donate pictures, programmes, old Church yearbooks, etc. that would be of lasting significance in the years ahead.

Recently the archives committee has secured a storage room

off the Kerygma room in which to house our growing collection of FSA historical artifacts. Now that we have our own work area, we will be able to continue to catalogue and process the significant amount of materials in our possession. In preparation for our Anniversary Service, members of our committee made a visit to the Weldon Library at UWO to obtain materials for our displays, and to familiarize ourselves with our documents in permanent storage there.

readers, and they provide an interesting look at life in rural Ontario in the last century. Almost half of her novels were written right here in our former manse. We have had several generous donations of her works from members in the congregation; at present we are missing only one of her books, Courageous Women (1934), which she wrote in collaboration with Lucy Maud Montgomery and other women writers of the period. Please visit the special Marian Keith display in the library. We welcome your ideas of how we can honour

this special famous Canadian.

In the future we hope to prepare a brochure that would orient new members and visitors to the rich architectural heritage of our magnificent church home. We hope to have a tour of Oakland Cemetery and to have several talks on the significance of the rich stained glass windows in the sanctuary. A new and updated church history is an ambitious long-range project for our committee.

Over the summer, the orders of service from 1990-1995 for both the 9:15 a.m. Chapel and the 11:00 a.m. Sanctuary service, as well as the announcement sheets, were prepared for permanent

The past year has been a very rewarding time of rediscovering a woman of great fame and distinction from our past. Mary Esther MacGregor (i.e. Marian Keith) was the wife of Dr. Donald MacGregor, pastor of St. Andrew's from 1914-36. Mrs. MacGregor was the author of nearly 20 novels and short stories, written between 1905-1960. Her works were, and still are, popular with
