THE SCORGIES - A FAMILY ON THE GO

Sue and Russ Scorgie met one summer as teenagers working at The Banff Springs Hotel. He was a dishwasher and lifeguard; she worked on the front desk. Much has happened in the intervening years, but today they are

once again working for the same company -- this time, Russ's architectural firm on Queens Avenue.

Sue and Russ both attended McGill University. After their marriage they remained in Quebec where Sue taught high school and Russ worked as an architect in Montreal.

Because of the political atmosphere in Quebec in 1976, they decided to return to their home province of Ontario and settle in London. Sue taught for eight years with the Elgin County school board while Russ completed his one year architectural indenture before launching his own firm.

Upon joining First-St. Andrew's, Sue and Russ became active members, participating in a variety of ways. Sue served as a member of the Community Outreach Committee and later as its chair, and was also an elder for a number of years. She presently teaches Sunday school and is a board member and past chair of Proudfoot House. Although the provincial government closed Proudfoot House and the property was recently sold, the board is still in existence and holds funds which could be used if the government were ever to reconsider its decision.

Russ too was an elder and also served on the long-range planning committee before taking on the huge task of directing the Access project. In the course of discussions within the long-range planning committee, the subject of accessibility became a major focus. Other church committees were consulted, and when the Access Project evolved, Russ's firm was asked to undertake its design and construction.

One of the biggest challenges, according to Russ, was preserving the traditional character of the building, yet dealing with such technical matters as the fire code, weight-bearing structures, and natural light availability. He also had to determine which of the <u>eighteen</u> different levels of the church were the most used, and then work out a plan to make them accessible to everyone.

PENTECOST 1998

Designing the Access Addition took approximately one year, and the actual construction, another year. It was officially opened and dedicated on January 8, 1995. Testament to the success of the project was the Urban Design Award presented by London City Council to FSA for its Access Addition.

Russ is now a member of the FSA Property Committee which recently completed renovations to Farquhar House. Although repairs have been done to the church, some major renovations are necessary to both the inside and outside of the building. Russ need not worry about a shortage of new projects.

In fact, it may be that Russ and Sue's two sons will be called on to help out with church tasks. As part of the FSA spring clean-up team, Blair, 14, enjoyed the experience, including riding the lawn-mower tractor. He hopes to do similar work in the summer. He is involved with the Teens in Transit program in addition to his snowboarding/skiing, baseball, karate and music activities.

In December, Craig, 9, played the role of Benjamin in the Christmas

Eve play at church. Like his brother, he is an avid snowboarder and skier, but also enjoys floor hockey, baseball and Cubs.

They share their love of the outdoors with their parents, and spend many winter weekends skiing in New York state. This summer they are planning a hiking and canoeing holiday in Killarney Park. In the meantime, they will continue their much-appreciated contributions to the life of this church.



CONTINUING ON THE ROAD TO HIGH-TECH!

About six years ago, a computer study committee was appointed to evaluate the office systems at our church. The members of the committee developed a needs assessment based on information gathered from the staff. They visited other centres to determine what software programs were available and to evaluate their suitability for our office.

Based on the recommendations in the committee's report, new computers were purchased with the following appropriate software: a Church Management Program

for church roll database, Accounting software to process revenue and expenses, a spreadsheet program to prepare financial reports, and an upgraded wordprocessing program.

Another innovative step was to join with other churches to outline Sunday service notices in the Saturday Free Press when the cost became prohibitive. Linked with that cooperative approach, the London Free Press invited churches to participate in the new Pressto-Line. Each week there were many calls by members of the congregation and others to inquire about Sunday service and other church activities. Unfortunately, the Free Press terminated the Pressto-Line last summer.

An opportunity to become involved on the World-Wide-Web was provided by Alex Horkay. He had some extra space available with Information London. You have probably noticed the small print at the bottom of our Sunday service announcements. The internet address is "www.info.london.on.ca/~alex/fsa.html" if you wish to receive information. The internet provides another opportunity to share our activities at First-St. Andrew's with former members and other interested people from as far away as British Columbia and Moscow!

A committee, including Paul Pergau and Alex Horkay, has been meeting regularly to plan and launch our own web page. With such a facility, Frank Meadows sees a future page unfolding that would accommodate weekly sermons, a current copy of Tidings, and all sorts of committee and volunteer interaction on the internet. Postal and telephone costs are dramatically reduced when messages are sent via e-mail.

Our latest venture into the world of high-tech involves the telephone system. The last update was in 1978. There has been an increased demand for more convenient and more efficient telecommunication services. Also, the ongoing repairs that plague an outdated system became a concern.

The response to the exciting new telephone system has been very positive. Although there are a variety of automatic functions, you will always be greeted by a pleasant "live" person (usually Pat) when you call during the day. You will be referred promptly to the person you seek or given the information you request.

The automated system is activated at lunch hour and when the office closes for the day. If you call the office after hours (679-8182), you will be invited to leave a message which will be forwarded to the appropriate person. From Wednesday to Saturday you will also be able to hear details of the Sunday service and upcoming music programs.


It is obvious that as First-St. Andrew's goes high-tech, it has not abandoned the personal touch!

Series: God's Stewards GERTRUDE BERGEY

Service to others has been a way of life for Gertrude Bergey ever since she began teaching at Wortley Road Public School in 1939. In that year she joined the Women Teachers' Federation, and eventually rose to become president of the organization.

After fourteen years teaching elementary school, Gertrude accepted an invitation to join the staff of London Teachers' College where she was granted tenure the following year.

As well as having a very successful teaching record, Gertrude also became a published author, having collaborated with two other women teachers on a series of readers for Kindergarten to Grade 3. These were published by Reinhart & Winston and used in Ontario schools, and quite possibly elsewhere in Canada.

Following cancer surgery in December 1975 (at which time her doctor promised her one year to live), Gertrude retired from teaching, and looked for something meaningful to do for a year. Mission Services asked her to help out as secretary, and she was soon "hooked." Working her way through the ranks, she became president and then a member of the Board of Directors. Under her leadership and guidance, Mission Services was built up to its original status. But Gertrude was also very involved in the front lines—working in the Thrift Store, helping with social support groups for young down-and-out women, and being involved on the Committee for Community Connections. During the next twenty years, Gertrude would become an integral part of Mission Services, particularly amongst the young women and teen girls. Many of them who had nowhere else to go would be invited to her home for Christmas.

At age 75, Gertrude decided that there were other interests she wanted to explore, and so retired from her second career. But just when she thought she was finished, she was asked to bring her expertise to the steering committee overseeing the amalgamation of the three branches of Mission Services. Her mandate was eventually completed, and Gertrude could finally retire.

In addition to her community involvement, Gertrude has enriched the life of FSA. The UCW, the choir, Membership & Nurture and Archives Committees have all benefitted from her active participation.

Recently, she received the Governor General's Caring Canadians Award in honour of her many years of work with Mission Services London. A "lady" in the most classic sense, Gertrude Bergey is certainly one of FSA's rare jewels! Thank you, Gertrude, for sharing your most remarkable self with us.

* peaceful ... welcoming ... the singing is cool ... a refreshing way to worship ... the worship is very challenging and very non-threatening ... my only totally quiet time in the whole week ... uplifting ... fun ... good fellowship ... (my favourite of all the comments) fattening

The services will continue until May 3. Newcomers are encouraged to come and try things out. You will be made very welcome. Alternative Worship will begin again in early September.

I believe that Susan Shelstad and the others providing leadership must be commended for their work in helping us to develop additional ways in which God can be truly worshipped. COUNCIL REPORTS TO YOU

The Annual Congregational Meeting of the Church was held on Sunday, Feb. 8, 1998. Doug McGregor reviewed the Policy & Procedures Manual Update and Scott Snelgrove presented the new budget for '98. The only change was a motion to fund-raise \$15,000 extra for Mission & Service Fund. The new council was elected and there was an acknowledgement of the wonderful contribution by the staff, both clergy and lay people.

The new Council met on February 10 and were duly installed on February 22.

At the April 14 meeting, Stan Hill gave us an update on the Vision Fund logo and pamphlet. (See the enclosed flyer) The updated Policy & Procedures will be ready in June.

The trustees and property committees made a presentation regarding repairs to the exterior of the building. The Council unanimously endorsed the proposal and it was brought to the congregation at a meeting held on April 19. After several questions, all answered to everyone's satisfaction, the motion read: That the congregation accept the recommendation of the trustees to use

capital funds to proceed with Phase I of a facility restoration program, to be carried out in 1998 at an estimated cost of \$140,000. The vote carried unanimously.

Earth Stewardship Sunday was April 26. We were asked to bring a branch or flower from the garden to place on a cross that lay on its side at the front of the church. This is called the Service of Greening the Cross. After church, a luncheon was held by the Community Outreach Committee to raise funds for two refugee families. Following the luncheon, Frank Meadows showed slides of his trip to Israel.

The finances of the church are holding steady with approximately \$150,000 in contributions to the middle of April. Please do not forget your envelope contributions during the summer months so that the church can maintain an adequate cash flow.

It is with regret that the Ministry & Personnel Committee accepted a letter of resignation from Susan Brown, our Office Manager. Susan is leaving August 31 to pursue a degree in Social Work. We have appreciated Susan's contributions to the life and work of First-St. Andrew's, and will miss her pleasant and helpful personality around the church. The long advance notice is very much appreciated in order to consider the office structure as we approach the 21st century.




