THE PERGAU FAMILY

Reach for the Top! That was the theme of the successful 2000 stewardship campaign co-

chaired by Paul and Lesley Pergau. For them, though, it seems the slogan wasn't coined just for the campaign, it's how they live their lives, always putting forth their best effort, striving for improvement and making the difference.

Paul was born in the Lac St. Jean area of Quebec in a very small paper mill community. Later his family moved to another small community (Sutton) in the Eastern Townships of Quebec. His family was very church oriented and musical. In fact, they were, on occasion, the entire choir with Mom the organist and soprano, sister alto, Paul tenor and yes, Dad sang bass.

Paul attended Mount Allison University in Sackville, New Brunswick where he completed a B.Sc., double major in Physics and Mathematics. At that point in his life, he left behind his small community lifestyle, moving to London to work for London Life. It was there, on the tennis courts, that he met Lesley.

He then joined FSA and found it a very different experience to be part of a large church community

and connected with Lesley's family, the Comforts, who were very high profile in the church. Now that would keep a young man on his toes!

Lesley is one of five children, the daughter of Maurice and Jean Comfort. She was born in London and raised at RR2 Thorndale. She walked to and attended a two-room schoolhouse until the regional school was built, after which she was bused at first to Leesboro and then to Dorchester for High School. She sang in school choirs and was very active in sports and student council.

Lesley grew up in the FSA community. She attended Sunday school, Mission Band, Explorers, and CGIT, sang in the junior choir and took piano lessons with Barrie Cabena.

She attended UWO and graduated with a B.Sc. in Mathematics. After graduating she worked at London Life where she met Paul.

At FSA in 1972, Alex Farquhar wed the couple. When their son, Daniel, was born in 1975, Lesley became a "home mom" for thirteen years. But that didn't stop her from getting out there and making the difference. During those years, she volunteered at the Children's

Museum, was treasurer of the board and kept the books for the Resource Centre. She also worked part-time for Weight Watchers and H & R Block over the years. At FSA, Lesley was very active in the young mothers UCW group. She speaks with excitement of the impact of this group for fellowship, spiritual growth and outreach.

Requiring an education fund when their daughter, Karen, decided to go away to school, Lesley returned to full-time work. She now works one day a week as a medical secretary to a Psychiatrist and four days a week at the Children's Hospital as a secretary support for Psychology and the coordinators of the children's care areas.

Many will fondly remember their children, Daniel and Karen, as very enthusiastic and active participants at FSA. They come by it honestly, with the role models of their parents and

grandparents. They attended Sunday school, and were part of Gone Fishing, Teen Ringers, youth productions and retreats.

GOD'S STEWARDS: THE KNOWLES

Jean and Bill Knowles have been members of First-St. Andrew's for over thirty years. They started worshiping at FSA in the late sixties when they lived in an apartment on Dufferin Street around the corner from the church. Jean grew up near Mount Brydges and belonged to Delaware United while Bill grew up in Toronto and was raised at Davenport Presbyterian Church and later Epworth United Church.

Jean and Bill describe themselves as having been socially conscious for a long time. Bill's sister became ill when he was in his twenties and he realized then that one cannot walk away from people in difficulty. They were both canvassers for the United Way at Canadian National, with Jean being CN's chair in The International Year of the Woman in 1975. During that time period they both became involved with what was referred to as the Women's Committee of Orchestra London.

Bill early took retirement from CN in the 1990s when early downsizing and transfers were taking place. Soon after his retirement he began volunteering at St. Paul's Daily Bread where he is now on the board of directors representing the United Church. At about that time he joined the Social Action committee at FSA.

Through his involvement with Social Action he got involved with Grow A Row, the Canadian Food Grains growing project. Bill and David Knoppert have been FSA representatives on the Grow A Row project with our St. Marys' partners.

Jean's marketing department at CN was terminated Canada-wide a year and a half after Bill retired. Her retirement allowed her to get more heavily involved with volunteer activities. When she was asked to join the Social Action committee she quickly jumped at the chance and became involved as an honourary member of the Grow A Row committee. Jean was also invited to join Daily Bread by its coordinator and did so at the end of 1994. Her activities with the Volunteer Committee of Orchestra London have grown to include bingos, boutiques at concerts, being coordinator of the flea market for the yearly spring rummage sale and a member of the executive committee. Bill works at boutiques, the rummage sale and helps Jean with Christmas gift wrapping at Cherryhill Mall. In the fall of 2000, Jean went to a Habitat for Humanity meeting and ended up offering to join the Faith Relations committee.

Both Jean and Bill are grateful that they were able to work for one company for over 30 years. When working with clients at Daily Bread they quickly learned how lucky there were to have had secure jobs, something they see as a rarity in today's society. Bill and Jean watch the folks they deal with at Daily Bread struggle to understand why they have to lobby governments to get a fair break in order to continue their fight for survival in our society.

Most of their clients have the courage and conviction to fight in order to improve their lives. The Knowles stress that visiting a food bank is not a comfortable thing to do, and that they try to be kind and Christian in dealing with the people. They point out that their work with Christmas Share at Daily Bread is made easier by the kindness and generosity of our FSA congregation with its increased contributions on White Gift Sunday.

EARTH STEWARDSHIP

Why are trees important to the environment? Most people think of trees as things of natural beauty, with their interesting shapes, changing foliage, and, in some cases, beautiful flowers. On hot summer days, trees are appreciated because they provide shade.

Of course trees are an essential part of the ecosystem. They provide nesting sites and food for many species of birds and mammals. Trees, however, serve another function - they take carbon dioxide (CO₃) from the air, convert it into plant material, and release

oxygen into the air.



Industrialised societies are responsible for putting a great deal of CO₂ into the air. Industrial processes, thermal electric plants, and automobiles are major sources of CO₂

emissions. CO₂ is one of the gases that contributes to global warming.

Trees, especially in the first 60 to 100 years of their lives, store large amounts of CO₂. Planting forests cannot compensate for all of the carbon released in the normal functioning of our society, but each tree we plant helps to store carbon, thereby reducing the amount of CO₂ in the atmosphere.

Planting trees and working to protect forests are ways for us to be good stewards of God's earth. Start thinking about how you can help to plant a tree this spring!

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 2001

(The comments are excerpts from the annual report by Ken Wright, Chair of the Finance Committee)



"The Year End Operating Summary for 2001 brings good news, in that once again we have come in under budget. The forecast for the year 2001 was a deficit of \$26,756 and the actual result was a deficit of \$21,405, \$3,000 under budget. The various committees are to be congratulated for their adherence to their budgets. The few budget line items that were over their limit were due to

uncontrollable circumstances such as increased utility and insurance rates.

On the income side, we closed many small "suspense" accounts which had been dormant for a few years and these, added to the profits from the previous musicals such as Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, have enabled us to keep our deficit within reason. The final debt figure for the year, \$21,405, will be covered by reducing that amount from the Johnson/Young Operating Fund. After that has been done, the Fund will stand at approximately \$15,000."

BIFOCALS OF FSA

HISTORY: In the mid 1950s when Angus MacQueen was our Senior Minister, he suggested to Lockie Miller that the Mr. & Mrs. Club should sub-divide into two groups: those couples whose combined age was 80+ and those whose combined age was less than 80. Planning meetings were held, and some of those taking part were Herb & Grace

Cocker; Maurice & Elizabeth Cowper-Smith; Bob & Mary Edy; Harry & Grace Gemmill; John & Dorothy Given; Faye & Ed McLean; Lockie & June Miller; Bill & Eleanor Ollerhead; and others.

The name initially was the "Alumni Club"; then in the early 1960s the present name, Bifocals, was adopted. Membership was open to all couples whose combined age was 80 or more, and members who had lost their mates were encouraged to remain in the club. Several times persons who were single asked if they could join. One person (Irene Snider) asked Rev. Tony Gazzard about becoming a member. Tony suggested, and the club agreed, that single persons (age 40+) be welcomed as members. It is now not necessary to have a mate, or even to wear bifocals, to be a member!

PURPOSES OF BIFOCALS: To foster friendship and fellowship, to partake of a wide variety of GOOD food, to participate in the sing-song, to enjoy interesting programs.

STATISTICS: Present membership (year 2002) is 130, and attendance averages between 70 and 100. Seven pot-luck dinners are held annually, 4th Tuesday of each month (6 pm) from October to May (December excluded).

ORGANIZATION: Coordinators - one couple; Vice Coordinators - one couple; Treasurers - one couple. Responsibility for meetings: There are 3 groups (40+ in each group) sharing duties in turn (meaning each group takes the lead twice per year.) Two couples are elected as Convenors of each group.

PROGRAM FORMAT: Meet & Greet - 6 pm. Grace - 6:30 p.m. Buffet meal (Our cooks are the best in the city!) Brief moment of business, sing-song led by Paul Merritt. Feature for the evening - Guest Speaker, or Travelogue, or Talent Night, or Fun Night, etc. Benediction - shortly after 8 pm.

THE LAYETTE LADY







THE VISITOR FROM BELLA COOLA

We can make a meaningful difference in Native Missions. That declaration was evident on Jan. 2 when the Reverend Betty Sangster spoke to a large gathering of U.C.W members and guests in the church parlour. It was an eagerly anticipated opportunity for people to hear from our dear friend and long time former member of First-St. Andrew's. Betty gratefully acknowledged and thanked the U.C.W. for

its gift of \$5,000 to the Building Fund for Emmanuel United Church in Bella Coola, B.C. where Betty ministers to the Nuxalk people. She took this opportunity to encourage us to look upon this U.C.W. act of giving support through sharing of funds as just a beginning to a greater understanding of this and other native communities. She stressed the need to show native people that we do care about their future . Betty elaborated on how we can be profoundly influenced and enriched as we learn more about the rich spiritual and cultural traditions and history of

native peoples.

Her presentation began with photos of her congregation at gatherings, celebrations, services and fundraising activities. She also showed an exquisite wood carving, a hand made ceremonial drum and a beautiful painting- all purchased from area artisans. This brought some of Bella Coola to us and helped us feel a connection.

The deep respect and love Betty feels for her congregation and community was evident as she shared stories about their history as a proud people and their struggles to find a place in the present day. She told of her childhood; living with her parents and siblings in Bella Coola and being allowed to watch ceremonies filled with tradition. The native and non-native people worked together to make the dream for a new church a reality. Through faith, time, effort and the pooling of talent and labour the actual demolition has been completed and a new building is well on its way. This has not been without pain as the old building filled with memories was torn down.




