INTRODUCING SUSAN SHELSTAD

If you have been away on holidays the last couple of weeks, you may not have had a chance to meet First-St. Andrew's newest staff member. Susan Shelstad, an ordained minister, joined our church family on July 1 as Minister of Christian Development. Prior to that she was the minister at Lucan United Church.

Raised in Barrie,

Ontario, Susan was involved in United Church activities right from the beginning. She started with Baby Band and moved on to Mission Band, and then to Explorers, CGIT, Junior Choir and Youth Group.

After earning a BA in English at Queen's University, she worked in her home church for a year before returning to Queen's to attend theological college. There she met her husband, Stephen, who was also in theology, and they were married in second year. Their first posting after graduation was a team ministry in Provost, Alberta where their two children, Naomi, now 17, and Sam, 14, were born.

Five years later the family moved back to Ontario when Steve accepted a position with a church in Windsor. Susan decided to remain at home with the children during that period of time.

Their next call was to Lucan, Ontario, for a team ministry, which they shared until 1993 when Stephen, in completing a Doctorate of Ministry, changed careers and became a writer. Susan remained as full-time minister at Lucan United Church for the next four years. She, too, is pursuing a Doctorate of Ministry and hopes to graduate

in 1999, specializing in spiritual guidance. While most of the course work can be done at home, she is required to make monthly trips to Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Detroit, and also to spend three consecutive weeks each year in Detroit. (...continued on next page)



YOUTH ON COMMITTEES AT FSA

Committees are the heart of any large organization, the wheels and gears that it depends on for the smooth operation of the whole. The volunteers who make up the many committees at First-St. Andrew's form a vital link in the circle of Christian worship and activity.

Young people are involved in diverse aspects of our church's committee life, including property maintenance, music, worship, and youth group leadership. For Mike Cornelissen, membership on the property committee has been a learning experience: "finding out things about the church that [he] never knew." Mike has been mowing the church lawn and doing general upkeep for several years now, and it was a natural step to become a member of the property committee when Emily Woods asked if he would like to. He is struck by "the immense cost of running the church," and how a lot of the work involves "just keeping the building and grounds from deteriorating." The main project the committee has been working on recently is compiling an inventory of everything the church needs to have fixed, and planning and budgeting so that by the year 2000 they are all completed. On the committee, Mike has contact with members of FSA who know a lot about the history behind the physical structure of FSA, and this interaction is one way to keep the stories and the knowledge of the site known, and to make sure that it is passed on through the generations.

Emily Cavers has been to one meeting of the music committee, and is looking forward to more. She likes the fact that the committee members "respect your opinion, even though you are younger," and commented on the relaxed atmosphere. Mr. Merritt asked her to join when a conflicting music rehearsal meant that Adam Guthrie could not make the Tuesday evening meetings. Emily had not realized how varied the activities of the music committee were, from setting up concerts to handling the food at the recent enormously successful Spring Fling.

As a member of the Youth and Young Adult Committee, Chris Silcox reports on TNT activities, and is involved in planning youth events. When pastoral relations set up a special subcommittee to look for a new Christian Development Director, Frank Meadows asked Chris to be a youth representative in the group. He was also their correspondence secretary, writing letters to candidates, and participating in interviews of potential candidates. When I asked him what he liked most about being on the committee, he commented, "I like to be able to have an effect on what's going on, making kids see that church is fun and a place where they belong." His goal is "trying to make sure that people grow and develop mutual respect for one another, and learn the value of giving your time to something you're a member of, not paid work, but something that benefits you."


Thanks to these and many other dedicated young people on committees at FSA, our church community can rest assured that we will continue to be the high achieving institution we know and love.

UPROOTED PEOPLES - about 13.2 million of them worldwide. In 1995, about 100 refugee sponsorships were undertaken by United Church congregations. Locally, the Jozic family from Bosnia was welcomed and supported during their transition to life in London by six north-central London churches. From M & S resources, legal counsel and advocacy services are available to refugees bewildered by immigration laws in an alien tongue.

For the next two years, UPROOTED PEOPLES is the study for United Church congregations. The current MANDATE magazine is a wonderful introduction to this study.

WHY SUPPORT THE DAILY BREAD FOODBANK?



Like many FSA members, I often include in my weekly grocery shopping a few sale items for the foodbank. But rather than dropping them in the bin so conveniently located near the entrance of the store, I make a point of taking them down to the church, where the food will be delivered to the Daily Bread Foodbank at St. Paul's Cathedral.

Why make this extra effort? Daily Bread operates very much like the London Foodbank, with one crucial difference: it does not draw upon the entire population of London for support. It relies solely on church people, a much smaller group. If we do not regularly support it, the cupboard may be bare when the needy come asking for support.

About 200 individuals per week receive assistance from Daily Bread. They are only allowed to come once every 3 months (similar restrictions apply at the London Foodbank.) Sometimes the supply of food runs low, and the amount of help that can be given a family is pathetically small. If we all give regularly, this will not happen.

Each time we shop for groceries, let us give thanks for our own daily bread, and show our thanks by donating to Daily Bread.





ENSURING THE FUTURE OF FSA: CHARITABLE BEQUESTS

In the previous edition I talked about gifting through Life Insurance, either on the life of a single donor or jointly on the lives of both spouses. This way of giving provides for the cash proceeds to FSA at death while receiving the non-refundable tax credits while alive.

The tax credit is applied to the current year's income tax return and, if not fully utilized, can be carried back to your previous year's tax return. A bequest also provides a gift at death either in the

form of money or property. One significant difference, however, is that the limit on how much you can claim as a donation on your final tax return increases to 100% of your net income instead of the proposed 75% of net income.

There could be advantages where a large estate is taxed at a high percentage rate, e.g. 50% or more. This can be caused by the fact that a person who dies is deemed to have disposed of everything owned a moment before death.

The benefits to FSA are that bequests tend to be larger than outright gifts, there are relatively few restrictions, and the gift can be used immediately.

The benefits to the donor are that they maintain full control of the gift while alive, there may be a tax credit on the final income tax return and there may be a reduction in capital gain taxation.

I have covered only the various basics of gifting through a bequest and I would caution anyone considering a gift that you contact the proper professionals before your final decision. Your lawyer can assist you with the proper wording for your bequest and also advise you on the best type of bequest. An accountant can advise you on any taxation issues of concern.

I would also caution that your family be aware of your intentions if they have an interest in the estate. This may reduce the possibility of problems occurring during the estate settlement.






