

MARGARET WATERS, A LADY OF DISTINCTION


As Margaret Waters sat in church, she thought to herself how beautiful the chancel window was. Her husband, Moir, had been responsible for overseeing the design and installation of this window. The fact that she came to be sitting in church one Sunday, able to enjoy its beauty, is the result of some excellent changes that were made to the church. With the new access addition, Margaret is once again able to enter the building.

Much of the history of First-St. Andrew's, from its foundation to the recent access addition, is connected with Margaret Waters' life. Born in Kitchener, Ontario, she had a mother who was very active in the church as President of the Women's Missionary Society and in many other areas. The family later moved to Winnipeg, and when Margaret was 16, to London, becoming part of the First Church congregation.

In 1940, Margaret Waters married the Rev. Moir A. J. Waters, a minister at the newly formed and newly renovated First-St. Andrew's United Church. The story of their courtship has a fairy tale quality. With the joining of the two churches, First and St. Andrew's, in 1938, there were two ministers for the new congregation. An arrangement was formed in which the ministers would take turns preaching, one on Sunday morning and the other Sunday evening, alternating each week. Margaret found herself going to church in the morning one week, and the evening the next week, depending on which service A. J. Waters was doing. They kept their courting a secret, driving out to St. Thomas and back after the Sunday evening service so as to get to know each other. The announcement of their engagement was a wonderful surprise to the congregation! A mere ten days after the wedding, the couple set off via a Pacific oceanliner for their medical missionary placement in India. Following in the footsteps of Moir's parents, a doctor and a nurse who had been living in India since before Moir's birth, the newlyweds spent the next

five years abroad. They travelled through Japan, stopping in Hong Kong and other places on their way to India. All this travel is somewhat miraculous considering it was right in the middle of World War II. In fact, the repatriation vessel which took Margaret and Moir back to Canada in 1945 - with their children, four year old Jim and four month old Heather was the first passenger ship to return to Canada after the war. They returned via the Atlantic Ocean, so the Waters family had literally travelled around the world!

return. After 1945, the Waters family stayed in Canada, starting at a new church in Toronto. Mrs. Waters says she and her children felt the pressure of being "the minister's family" - their behaviour set the standard. "Moir was a good preacher," says Margaret with quiet pride, "so people liked him" and by extension, his family.

Margaret is described by her daughter, Heather, with whom Margaret now resides, as the quieter one of the couple. Her father, A.J., was more outgoing, with "a great sense of humour". The impression I received is that of a devoted couple who complemented each other's strengths and gave a lot to whatever community they were in. In 1948 the family moved to Victoria, B.C. where they remained for the next 7 years. Margaret did a lot of cooking during this period, and Christmas photos always show one or more strangers who were invited to join the family dinner. "Sometimes being a minister's wife was fun" she says with a twinkle in her eye. "I would put the roast in the oven before church and then tell my husband that he could only preach for so long, so it wouldn't be overdone! I'd ask him 'how many potatoes?' on the way out."

Margaret has a degree in nursing from U.W.O. As a minister's wife during the 1950's, she sometimes felt that she was required to choose between her husband and her job. However, she did not want to see her nursing abilities wasted and eventually took several jobs as health nurse educator in the schools.

Margaret sits in the atrium Sunday morning, waiting for her daughter to park the car and join her. She enjoys the chance to observe all the people who use the access doors; "it is a wonderful welcoming environment." Welcome back, Margaret!

FSA RECEIVES CITY OF LONDON AWARD By Russ Gonder

On Monday evening, December 4th, 19 members from First-St. Andrew's attended a London City Council meeting for the presentation of the Urban Design Awards for 1995. Our Access Addition was the recipient of the First Award for the outstanding entry in all categories!

These awards are made each year to architectural firms and their clients, by the City of London in conjunction with the London Society of Architects to recognize outstanding architectural achievements. A

total of five awards are given, four for distinct classes of projects and a fifth, the First Award, to recognize an outstanding entry from all submissions

Russ Scorgie's firm, the architects for the Access Addition, were the recipients of another award for the Gainsborough Seniors' Residence. under the "new residential/ domestic buildings" classification.

The award received by FSA consisted of a brass plaque which will be mounted on the exterior of the building and a certificate which will be displayed inside.

The reasons cited for the award were:

"Preserving the character and replicating the craft of the original Church building this new "accessible entrance" is cleverly oriented on a 45 degree angle so as not to detract from the "ceremonial" front entrance and facade. A functional hallmark of the design, the almost concealed glass atrium that unites the brick structure to the existing east wall of the sanctuary preserves an unimpeded flow of light to

the gothic windows of the original building."

This award is a welcome endorsement of our addition by design professionals in the community. It is consistent with the praise the project has received from many others in the church and community. We are the proud recipient of an addition to our church that is not only outstanding in appearance, but also one which functionally supports and enhances the worth of all other areas of the church as well.

During the Fall, many things have happened:

- Charlotte Ann Bell was made a corresponding member of Council as she studies for the Diaconal Ministry, currently under the supervision of Marion;
- the need for portable

staging has long been understood, and now it is within sight as the Trustees have allocated \$6,000, and the Music Committee \$2,000 towards its purchase;

• the Foodgrains Project is complete, making \$67,000 available for food for hungry people.

The Stewardship campaign has come and gone, providing updated information to Volunteer Management and Finance.

Every Sunday we have a warm worship environment with excellent preaching and wonderful music. Our warmest thanks to all of our staff and many volunteers who help to make all of these things, and much more, happen in our Congregation.

At our December meeting, attended by members of our Congregation, the Strategic Planning Marketing Committee presented its final report. Because of the "change" that it represents, we followed up at the January meeting with two presentations. The first was by Frank Meadows discussing the paradigm changes that the church has undergone and is undergoing. This was followed by a presentation on "Managing Change" by Wendell Davidson. Wendell is an Education Consultant with London Life Insurance. These presentations resulted in very positive feedback from Council members.

I am sure we are all delighted that our new Access won first place in the 1995 Urban Design Awards. The certificate and plaque are on view in the Atrium

There is a need for a Mail Centre in our church. At a recent Council meeting, we were delighted to hear from the U.C.W. that they would fund this centre to be placed in the Atrium. Communications are vital to our congregation and this gift will strengthen this aspect of our Congregational Life.

Our financial picture for 1995 is very gratifying. We have achieved a surplus which means that we met our original Mission and Service target and have funds to start us off in 1996. Many people made special contributions in time and money to achieve this result. We're grateful to you.

Now we all look forward to the Annual Meeting on **February 18** after church. I hope you will be there. It is important to participate and we appreciate your input.

A LOOK AT THE PROPERTY COMMITTEE

Ever find yourself sitting in the church before the service wondering who looks after the multitude of repairs and maintenance issues connected with a building and property of this magnitude? Ever ponder what changes you would make if this were your responsibility? How would you set priorities for the seemingly endless list of repairs, alterations and additions needed to keep it in the excellent condition that a church of this historic and personal magnitude deserves for all who worship here?

Needless to say, this is a very tall order but one well within the capabilities of the dedicated members of the Property Committee. Under the creative and dynamic leadership of chairperson Robin Procunier, members Al Taylor, Gib Cole, Ed Ellis, Bob Vosper, John Jardine, Jim Hendry, and Russ Scorgie pool their energy and personal skills to accomplish the jobs of property management. Susan Brown, Paul Huston and Lu McLean are also members in an ex-officio capacity.

As Robin is quick to point out, we are blessed with an enormous wealth of time, talent and resources in the congregation and within this committee. An examination of what brings us to this great church would certainly include the excellent leadership in worship,

children's programs, the music program, mission and service, just to mention a few. But there is also a shared passion for this 126 year old structure that makes us all work that extra bit harder to maintain this magnificent building for ourselves and all those who come after us. In the past year, the property Committee has overseen the restoration of the "Ross memorial" stained glass window, the replacement of stained glass in the main entrance, the removal and installation of the parlour ceiling, the decorating of the fireside hallway, installation of new carpet and lighting repairs to Catherine's office, replacement waterlines and sewer connections, landscaping,

restoration to parapet walls and the illumination of the stained glass window at the front of the sanctuary ... just to mention a few of the tasks completed in '95. The list for 1996 has not yet been finalized but we do know we need immediate replacement of a major portion of the roof over the Sunday school building for a start.

As a group, the property committee members all share an interest in the challenges of a historic building. Collectively this committee has an abundance of interest, experience and passion for solving problems to get the work done in the most cost efficient manner. For example, Gib Cole brings to the committee over forty years of mechanical expertise and familiarity with systems within the church. He has seen many changes over the years including the moving of the organ, the removal of the side balconies, the installation of the chair lift and the replacement of the old boiler. Gib enjoys the challenges of tackling problems in an old building for there are always "lots of surprises". Of all the changes Gib has seen over the years, he feels that Access has been our finest improvement to the functioning of FSA.

Al Taylor is also a long time member of our church who has

witnessed many changes and helped provide us with the continuity that is so valuable. Presently, he oversees the repair and management needs of Farquhar House.

Jim Hendry, a more recent member to FSA, brings his experience in construction and manufacturing technology to the committee. Like the others, he also feels that maintaining the magnificence of our Church should be our first priority. He is awed by the construction of the sanctuary with its massive roof timbers, steeple and structural features. It is the character and integrity of the building that he feels is necessary to maintain as we go about repairing, up-dating and re-structuring some of its space and functions.

John Jardine also shares this belief in maintaining the character and integrity of the building. John brings his experience in engineering, construction methods and utilities services to the committee. He feels that the warmth and character of our church far exceeds any of the many structural or mechanical concerns it presents. Some might argue that the endless nooks and crannies give it more charm than practical efficiency.

Ed Ellis joined the Property Committee under Russ Gonder's leadership and quickly felt that this was the place where he could be of service to the church. He enjoys the camaraderie of this group and also respects their diligence and hard work. Ed enjoys

tackling the practical jobs that this group undertakes and doesn't mind getting a bit dirty doing so. At this time he and Bill Davidson of the congregation are busy revitalizing the cracked pews with a "special wood finish enhancer".

Bob Vosper is another member who has served this church in almost every capacity for over forty years. If you know what to look for, you will see his handiwork in almost every area of FSA. A talented craftsman and woodworker, Bob enjoys building cabinets, shelving units and bulletin boards, as well as fixing stoves, overseeing waterline and other repairs.

Russ Scorgie wears many hats around FSA. Prior to being a member of this committee, he served on the long-range planning committee that resulted in his role on the Access Committee. He was the architect who directed the Access project, overseeing the design phase, the working drawings and much of the construction. From his perspective, he feels that this committee has an enormous responsibility for maintaining the Church's integrity while keeping in mind its age and historical significance. As Russ remarked, "we need a master plan when approaching the repairs and changes to our building. We cannot just tackle things a room at a time without an integrating theme. There must be a concern for continuity throughout the building as we take a long-term approach to the preservation of the church." Russ also made the point that our church is constantly evolving as it meets the current needs of the congregation and as repairs and renovations are undertaken. Although he feels that it is important that the building evolve to meet the present needs of the congregation, it must be brought about so that the overall integrity of the original architectural structure is kept. I guess this rules out vinyl siding and other low maintenance products!

This is a great committee and new members are warmly welcomed and, as I found out, quickly put to work.

Lent, Holy Week & Easter 1996

Dear Friends,

Welcome to Lent - a time to Jeast. No, that's not a misprint. Lent is a time to Jeast. Usually we think the opposite. We think of Lent as a time of preparation during which Christians, recalling Jesus' fast in the wilderness, give up some of their favourite things as a form of spiritual discipline. Of course, there is much to be gained by that sort of discipline, and it commends itself to us these days in which so many people are trying to simplify their life to reduce stress.

But here is another way to look at the season of Lent. The season begins with the story of Jesus fasting in the wilderness and being tempted by Satan. [Matthew 4:1-11] Satan suggests that in order to satisfy his hunger, Jesus should turn the stones on the ground into loaves of bread. Jesus responds by every word that comes from the mouth of God." To live by every word that comes from the mouth of God." To live by every word that comes from the richness of what God has done and said. It is an invitation to a Jeast of life, a Jeast of justice, a Jeast of love.

Imagine yourself going to a Sunday brunch after church. You see all of your favourite things on the buffet and you see a few things you don't recognize. Most of us will stick with the omelets, the hash browns and the little sausages, and we leave those funny things that look like wrinkled charcoal alone. Until someone offers you one off his plate, and it tastes so good that you go back to get a helping for yourself.

That's the way it tends to be with our approach to God's word. It is such rich fare, with such incredible variety, that we are tempted to stick with the passages and ideas that we already know. But Lent offers us an opportunity to deepen and widen our knowledge and appreciation of 'every word that comes from the mouth of God'. We need to hear the words of reproof. We need to hear the words which expand our sense of community and enlarge our vision of the family and household of God.

How desperately we need to recover the fullness of Christ's witness in an age when the Bible is often used selectively to justify exclusion and repression. Let us feast together this Lent on every word that comes from the mouth of God, and we will surely discover that Jesus is feasting with us.
