A FAMILY PORTRAIT

Nine years ago the Silcox family was looking for a new church home in London. As a result of their decision to join First-St. Andrew's, this congregation has been enriched by the talents and energy they have brought with them.

One of the important features of the United Church that appealed to Jim and JoAnn Silcox was its strong support of social advocacy programs. FSA in particular attracted them because it seemed to be a place where their children, Chris, Tim and Pam, could have a voice.

Chris, the youngest of the Silcox children is now in his fourth year of Political Science at Western with chartered accountancy as his career goal. He was one of the founders of the Teens in Transit group at FSA, and shares the leadership duties of the group with four others, including his girlfriend, Leah Bacon. He is

sponsoring a confirmand this year, and is also a member of the Christian Development committee. Outside of church he works at Chapters bookstore in Masonville, participates in hockey pools and collects music and videos.

Tim Silcox seems to be heading in the direction of the financial world for his career. Right now he is taking a year off University and is studying the Canadian Securities course on his own. In addition to being a member of the FSA congregation, he volunteers his time as an assistant coach for Junior Boys' basketball at Lucas.

Pam, the eldest, has completed her Master's degree in Counselling Psychology and is now working as a career counsellor at UWO's Student Development Centre. Like her brothers, she uses her spare time to help others both within the church and outside. Pam's activities include helping with makeup for "Joseph", future membership in the FSA Volunteer Committee, and work with Youth Opportunities Unlimited, and the Crohn's and Colitis Foundation. Somehow she still finds time to spend with her close friend, James Bere, a member of Metropolitan United Church.

The desire to help others is something the Silcox children come by naturally. Their parents, JoAnn and Jim, have set the example in their church involvement and in the careers they have chosen. Both physicians, they met at Medical School at Western and married

during their post-graduate training in 1968.

JoAnn practises clinical psychiatry four and a half days per week,

and spends the other half day at Huron College doing research for her second Master's degree in Theological Studies. With this background, she is well qualified for her leadership of both the Sunday morning and Alternative Worship Bible study groups. On top of this already-daunting schedule, JoAnn participates in the United Church Conference Board, two FSA Committees (Ministry & Personnel and Christian Development), and the FSA Counselling Team which she helped to establish.

Jim describes himself as "the quiet member of the duo." A regular church-goer, he jokes that his volunteer work at church seems to centre around food: flipping pancakes at the Shrove Tuesday supper, working at the fall

barbecue and helping to serve meals in the Out

of the Cold program. These activities are all in addition to his professional responsibilities as a gynaecologist at St. Joseph's Health Centre and his position as Associate Dean of the Faculty of Medicine.

FSA is truly blessed to have among its members a family with such a sense of personal commitment to others.

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FALL STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN A CONTINUED SUCCESS

Last fall's Stewardship Campaign was the second of a three year cycle using the "Making the Difference" slogan. We are pleased to announce that we continued to make a difference by matching last year's total amount in pledges.

The success was due in a large measure to all who contributed to the special programmes during the campaign period - the many who participated in "FSA on Display";

the M&S, Music, Volunteer Management and Christian Development Committees with their special presentations; those responsible for the buttons and banners; the follow-up telephoners and the support and encouragement of the Chair of Council, Annabelle Logan, and the Chair of Stewardship Committee, Brian Cram.

322 pledges were received for \$432,440. This was an increase of \$21,915 or 5.34% for those who had pledged in 1997. The average pledge was \$1,342.98, an increase of \$41.63 or 3.20% over last year.

With estimated unpledged envelope givings of \$77,560, we have been able to recommend to the Finance Committee a figure of \$510,000 for the 1999 budget, a 2% increase over 1998.

The results provide a wonderful statement of our congregation's commitment to the witness and mission of First-St. Andrew's.

Entering the work force can be a daunting, frightening experience, especially for those who are either returning from an absence or are venturing out into the world of employment for the first time. Often, women are faced with added pressures, particularly in wearing appropriate attire that will "make or break" the first impression in the interview process. Beth Girvan has been involved

with *Clothing Works*, a project in London supporting women entering the job market. This service provides job-ready attire at no cost to women specifically facing economic challenges.

There are shops where women can and do purchase clothing at a low cost. However, they do not specifically focus on clothes appropriate to the work place. "There's no place that they go where there's job-ready attire that's free. Most of them are women who have gone through an enormous amount of training and are finally at the stage where they are at the job interview," says Beth. Many won't need a new outfit, "but for a number of women, it's the last little piece. They've done everything they can and now they have to present themselves at the job interview." They all deserve an equal chance.

ClothingWorks has integrated the best components from like programmes in Toronto and the United States, and is guided by a diverse steering committee.

Several employment agencies have established an alliance with *ClothingWorks*, and can refer up to 15 clients a week. Customers are also referred by many other community organizations.

How does *ClothingWorks* work? Very simply. It relies on donations of current, clean, quality clothing that women are willing to donate. To arrange pick-up of the donation, call *ClothingWorks* at 672-3780. Clients make appointments to visit the centrally located "wardrobe closet", and are assisted by volunteers in choosing attire appropriate for their job search.

ClothingWorks is a hand up, not a hand out. Business apparel that one no longer wears can be shared with women who really can use it. Pants, blouses, skirts, jackets, suits, dresses, shoes, accessories, and new unopened cosmetics or pantyhose are always

welcome and appreciated, as long as they are on hangers, clean, in excellent condition, and ready for use. Plus sizes are especially needed.

Beth takes our mission statement into the community. Through *ClothingWorks*, she reaches out to, renews, and rejoices with others in a way that a practical need is met in a very practical way.



I know that you will all welcome and support Dr. Bill Watson as he takes the helm. Bill has a wealth of experience and knowledge of this church and the United Church as a whole. He is certainly the perfect person for taking First-St.

Andrew's into the new millennium.

Council has had two meetings - the first being on Dec. 8. At that time Council unanimously endorsed a letter from Kevin Johnston requesting that he be presented as an Inquirer for candidacy towards ordered ministry in the United Church of Canada. Congratulations, Kevin! Paul Pergau and Terry Peters presented the new web site and it was received with great enthusiasm. Terry Peters and Lesley Pergau presented wonderful information from the Needs Assessment Committee. More will be presented at the Annual Meeting, Feb. 7, 1999. Herb Wonfor, our Stewardship Campaign chair, brought us up to date on the pledges. With 314 pledges in, the total comes to \$423,870, giving us an increase of \$21,000 over 1998. They presented the 1999 budget at the January 12 Council Meeting. The budget will be presented at the Annual Meeting, Feb. 7, 1999.

The first Council Meeting of the new 1999 Council will meet Tuesday, Feb. 9 at 7:30 p.m. I wish the Council and its members and all of you, my very best in good health and happiness for 1999. God bless to all.

It was two years ago, closing night of *Godspell*, emotions were high. There was a feeling of tremendous accomplishment on the

part of all those involved. The cast, crew and creative team were buoyed by the audience response and we all felt good. Then someone innocently asked "What's next?" That's when *Joseph* began.

From November 11-14, 1998, First-St. Andrew's was shaking to its very foundations with the upbeat energy and creative talent of 50 actors, dozens of crew members, and a production team of over a hundred people. The show was entertaining, energetic, colourful and poignant. It retold



a familiar story in a way that was designed to reach both young and old. It was the culmination of two years of planning, and months of work.

Behind the scenes, a production such as *Joseph* requires several key elements which have to work together to achieve an end result. First and foremost there must be a production team committed to bringing to life the thousands of details that create the final picture. Under the skilful leadership of Glenda Pennington, many volunteers were solicited to head up areas such as Programme/Poster, Publicity, Ticket Sales, Costumes, Makeup, Set Construction, Properties and many more. These people

worked with their own teams to develop the show that you watched.



As well, there has to be a creative team which develops a vision, a look for the show. How will it sound? What symbols will be used? Where will the dance sequences be? These are all questions which were handled by George Jolink, Glenda Pennington, Angela Southern, Laura Wood and Andrew Kilpatrick. More than many shows, *Joseph* features music and dance. The work of Angela and Laura was inspiring. Moving 50 actors quickly in a tight



space presents unique problems. Through flexible and collaborative approaches, this team presented a show that worked well in our historic sanctuary.

The final ingredients were the collective efforts of cast and crew which brought the creative vision to life. The singing talents, the dancing, the lights and sound, the props and costumes made the *Joseph* dream a reality. Special mention should be made of the coat which was designed by Margie Hennen in a process that began in the spring. Painstakingly handcrafted by Carol Shaw and Nancy Hutchinson, our "Technicolor Dreamcoat" was amazing!

Many people both inside and outside of First-St. Andrew's have asked, how is it that this church is able to mount successful large scale productions such as *Godspell* and *Joseph*? Quite simply, we "think it, want it, and dream it." Drama at FSA in this form has





our goal. Our community preview performance was well received, and this production allowed FSA to make a significant contribution to ELUCOC.

Once again First-St. Andrew's presented a musical which played to sold out houses and was very well received by its audiences. Once again there was an excitement in the air on closing night. Once again, someone innocently asked, "What's next?"
