Rev. David McKane wasn't feeling like himself yesterday morning.

"Hello Father Wesley," replied the crowd of about 100, waving and chuckling at the spectacle.

"It's a great way of making the event come alive," said Joann Silcox, a church member for 15 years.

Point Pelee National & Rondeau Provincial Parks are the most southerly peninsulas in Canada where, on a lucky day, one can be surrounded by orioles, scarlet tanagers and warblers. Closer, a walk on trails along the Thames will yield many exciting sights and sounds.

Birdwathing enhances our awareness of birding habitat and teaches us to conserve this habitat.

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CONFERENCE REPORT

The moral and ethical issues surrouding the use of alcohol and gambling proceeds have been fiercely debated in the past, but without a generally satisfactory resolution. The debate continued at London Conference 2003 in late May in Sault St. Marie and there still isn't a resolution.

Although not for trying.

Both issues were passed on to General Council,

the governing body of the church, for resolution.

Resolutions governing the use of alcohol during church functions were hotly debated, but eventually sent on to General Council for an overall clear policy. Currently, the policy is one of voluntary abstention. It is up to individual churches to decide what to do.

Resolutions on the use of gambling dollars were also debated at length, but eventually also sent on to General Council. The resolutions to change church policy (which now urges churches to refrain from applying for grants such as Trillium) weres brought forward by the Ministries for Camping and Persons with Disabilities.

One interesting motion approved by London Conference called on the United Church to petition the Federal Government to reexamine the Truscott case.

Several motions calling on the church to prod the government on income security and affordable housing issues were also approved.

Rev. Richard Bott from St. Mary's was installed as President of London Conference. President-elect is Marilyn Hart from Middlesex Presbytery. Next year's meeting will be held in mid-May in London.

The meeting of General Council will be held in mid-August at Acadia University in Wolfville, NS. I was fortunate to be elected as one of the half dozen delegates from Middlesex Presbytery.

The theme of the meeting is "There is Hope". The three major issues for discussion are: Building Right Relationships with Native Peoples and Interracial Issue; Mission and its Funding; and What Next? (dealing with the reorganization of the church).

I'll be glad to answer any questions you might have about Conference or General Council.

TOM AND MARY MCLARTY

The McLartys, Tom and Mary, practitioners of the Healing and Visual Arts, married in 1950.

Tom was born and raised in London, but his origins can be traced back through Scotland, Ireland and the Orkneys. His father was raised on the Sunningdale site of north London. But this fact, as Tom somewhat ruefully acknowledges, has not endowed him with golfing skills. Unlike a

better known Canadian exponent of the game he did switch from being a 'leftie' to a 'rightie'.

But he progressed in other fields with ease and distinction through Wortley Road school, to South Collegiate, to two years of

service in the Canadian Air Force, and post-demobilization through UWO Medical School to graduation in 1952. He remembers two of his teachers with special affection and respect - the surgeons Angus McLachlan and Archie Grace - the major reasons for his decision to choose surgery as his own specialty.

The years 1957 through 1960 were spent in post-graduate study at St. Marks and Central Middlesex hospitals in London, England, and the Leahy Clinic in Boston. He then returned to

London and an increasingly busy clinical and teaching practice, which came to focus on gastrointestinal problems.

His church life began at First Church. He moved with his family, as a boy, to St. Andrew's church at the time of church union in 1932, which brought the two congregations together in what we know as First-St. Andrew's United Church.

His main 'hobby' was farming. He bought his first farm at Kincardine in 1960, others later, and maintained that interest throughout his working career as a busy surgeon.

As a dedicated member of FSA he served on what used to be called 'The Session', until it became 'The Church Council', participated in two search committees, and taught in the Junior Sunday School.

He has finally retired from surgical practice in which he had a career distinguished by, among other things, the fact that he was the first surgeon in Canada to perform laparoscopic surgery. But perhaps even more than that, though he wouldn't tell you this himself, he was regarded by his surgical colleagues as 'the surgeon's surgeon'.

Mary was born in Walkerton, where her father was a minister in the Anglican Church. This explains why her childhood was spent in Brantford, Thorndale, Preston, Cambridge and Guelph. After training as a teacher she was stationed at Aberdeen School here in London. She met Tom while he was still a medical student, being introduced to him by a certain Bill McGinnis, who was Tom's co-dissector at an anatomy table! (This is how you get to know people inside out.) They were married during Tom's third year as a medical student, and subsequently joined First-St. Andrew's.

Her interest in painting began at London's Polytechnic in Regent St., when she travelled with Tom to England in 1957. He must have approved of this initiative, because he presented her with a box of oil paints! And then the interest in art flourished as she travelled with Tom to Boston on the next stage of his postgraduate training.

Then the family came fast. Kate in '60, John in '62, Jane in '64 and Sarah in '68. It is understandable, therefore, why she did not get back to serious painting until 1972. She has subsequently exhibited at Beal, in Ingersoll, and at the Western Fair. If she has any regrets in all of this, they are apparent when she reflects wistfully that she would have liked to pursue art as a career.

If you would like to see one of her art works, go to the London Gallery Art Rental, where you will find her 'Black's Point in November', a pastel from the Bruce Peninsula.

Music has also been an important part of her life - the Junior Girls Choir in Cambridge till grade Eight, Earl Terry's 'All Girls Choir', and , of course, our own FSA choir.


Bill has been a choir member since 1975. He is Chairperson of the Youth Component of the Christian Development Committee. and has been a member of the Social Action Committee. He attends

We have again had the pleasure of recognizing some of the people at FSA who make a difference in our community. There are so many, but today I

I, as your representative attended the sod-turning at the site of the addition to **Mission Services London**. BEADS OF HOPE CAMPAIGN

The World Has HIV-AIDS, Act Now! It is this message that The United Church of Canada hopes its congregations will hear and respond to as it launches a two-year, one million dollar appeal to address the growing HIV-AIDS pandemic that is gripping the world.

According to recent UN AIDS' statistics, 20 million people have died of AIDS-related illnesses, 40 million people are currently infected with HIV and 14 million children have been orphaned.

*While it is true that the impact of HIV-AIDS is most evident in some parts of Africa, the spread of the disease is not isolated to that part of the world.

In Asia, home to half the world's population, the HIV-AIDS epidemic is poised to explode to similar, if not greater, levels than Africa.

In China, home to one fifth of the world population, the prevalence of HIV rose more than 67% in the first 6 months of 2001.

India has more people living with HIV than any country other than South Africa.

AIDS is now the leading cause of death in some countries in the Caribbean.

The United Church's appeal, which incorporates awareness raising, advocacy and fundraising, is called THE BEADS OF HOPE CAMPAIGN. The intricate handiwork of several South African women's groups who are producing thousands of pins incorporating the image of a crossed red ribbon, the international AIDS symbol, inspired the name. These pins are being sold as a fund-raiser.

On Sunday, March 23, we launched our BEADS OF HOPE campaign. Following a very inspirational service, the Stewardship, Outreach and Mission committee served lunch to more than 100 people. Following lunch Gloria Aykroyd and Jean Wright gave us some insight into the world of HIV-AIDS.

Gloria is a social worker and the Programme Co-ordinator of the St.

Joseph's HIV Care Programme. Almost 900 patients have been registered since the programme opened in 1990. Gloria attended the 2002 international AIDS conference in Durban South Africa; the theme of which was "Break the Silence". Fifty percent of AIDS cases worldwide are now women; there are 7.5 new infections every minute.

If you would like more information on AIDS, a video is available in the church library entitled BEADS OF HOPE, produced by VISION TV which includes an interview with Stephen Lewis who is the UN special envoy on AIDS in Africa.

So far we have received \$4,597.43 from overseas relief offerings and the sale of BEADS OF HOPE pins.



I will be going to the Virden-Wallace pastoral Charge in Virden, Manitoba, to begin my Internship on September 1st. This is the same P/C where Rev. Phyllis Barnes experienced her internship in the late 1970's.

There are over 500 families in the Virden congregation. Average attendance is about 175 per week plus a 20-25 member choir. Wallace is much smaller, with 36 families and average attendance of

15 per week.

Virden is located on Number 1 highway near the Saskatchewan border, midway between Winnipeg and Regina. The nearest big city is Brandon, about 75 km to the east. Across from St. Paul's United in Virden is the area Youth for Christ. There are several other churches in the town.

St. Paul's celebrated its centennial in 1982, and Wallace in 2000. St. Paul's has a Sunday School of 25-40, and Wallace 6-10. Both congregations are fairly conservative.

With 45-55 funerals and 15-20 weddings a year, there is ample opportunity for outreach, and since there is a good number of retired families, there is a constant need for visitation. The area is also about to undertake a Palliative Care initiative through the Regional Health Authority, and there is a crisis team for the hospital and local schools.

It is the charge's hope that I will be involved in every aspect of rural ministry.

SOLAR ENERGY

Solar energy can be utilized in many ways, principally through two distinct technologies, solar heating and solar electricity. Solar water heating systems can be used in a number of applications including campgrounds, condominium apartment buildings, car washes, restaurants, greenhouses, food processing plants, laundromats and health clubs.

Solar electric modules which use the photovoltaic effect, produce

electricity to be used in remote locations or for emergency or backup power. They are popular at cottages and are used on highway traffic signs.

Solar water heating systems can be large, for commercial or industrial use, or small for residential systems. They are similar in principle, varying only in size. The solar collectors are usually located on the roof, where they receive the sun's energy. In a solar water heating system, heat transfer fluid is circulated between the collectors and a heat exchanger, where the heat is either used or stored in a hot water

storage tank. The most common type of solar system for year round use in Canada uses antifreeze as the working fluid.

A car wash is an excellent application for commercial solar water heating because it is a low temperature application, and the load matches the availability of solar energy. Another excellent application is a laundromat, and one of the very best is a nursing home. When a system is properly designed based on the energy demand and cost savings, the solar fraction is normally about a quarter of the total hot water load.

A major design consideration is the positioning of the solar collectors, which should face the sun as much as possible. In Canada this means facing south. The collectors should be mounted on a rack tilted at an angle. They may be exposed to wind, so the rack must be securely fastened to the roof. During the winter, snow can accumulate around the panels causing an extra weight load on

the roof. Therefore, the supporting structure for the collectors must be able to resist the uplift due to the wind as well as the extra load of snow.

Solar hot water systems will work throughout the year, as long as the sun is shining. However, the collectors are not as efficient in the winter. But even if the outside air temperature is -15C, water can be heated from 5C to 15C, representing a substantial energy saving.

Typical problems with solar hot water systems are leaks, failed pumps, or faulty controllers. But they make up for their quirks by requiring little to no maintenance. Any dust accumulation gets washed away with the first rainfall.

Currently, solar (or wind) systems cannot replace the electrip power that industry relies on. However, using solar energy to supplement heating and hot water from regular forms of energy is feasible and viable today, and will reduce greenhouse gases. I believe that anything we can do to enhance the health of our planet is worthwhile.
